



Montreal says that it has been announced on unofficial but unimpeachable authority that Major the Rev. Dr. Bruce Taylor, of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Montreul, has been approached to accept the principalship of Queen's University as successor to Rev. Dr. Gordon, who has resigned owing to the condition of his health and to take effect at the close of the college term in

Members of the Board of Trustees of Queen's say that no appointment has been made, but they do admit that Rev. Dr. Taylor's name is mentioned and with every likelihood of his accepting the appointment if confirmed by the board.

Dr. Taylor is one of the ablest preachers in Canada. He came from Scotland as successor to Rev. Dr. James Barclay some years ago: Besides being a divine he is an able
