THE O.R.F.U. CAMPAIGN IS TAKING SHAPE

The Football Enthusiasts Throughout Province Preparing For Gridiron.

Woodstock Collegiate Institute have again announced their intention of entering a team in the junior series of the O. R. F. U. Nothing has been heard as yet from Woodstock College, but it is expected that they will also enter again. The two Industrial City teams always have an interesting series.

Petrolia High School will again be grouped with Sarnia Collegiate in the junior series of the O. R. F. U. An effort will be made to get two more teams into line in that section so as to form a four-team group. Stratroy was in this group last season. Though they have not been heard from as yet, they are expected to again enter a fourteen in the field.

If possible University Schools may be grouped in the junior series with Hamilton Collegiate. Ben Simpson, the well-known Hamilton player, is interested in the boys at the Ambitious City institution and has been asked to place a team in the Provincial union.

Through a great hockey centre, Kitchener has never done much in the football line, although years ago it was a famous soccer town. An effort is being made to boom the game in that city, and the Collegiate Institute may be prevailed upon to take up the gridiron pastime. They might be grouped with Stratford.

THE WORLD'S SERIES

Started Earlier Once Before in the Year 1904.

Only once before in their five previous pennant winning years have the Giants clinched the flag as early as September 24th. In 1904, when they give McGraw his first pennant here, they were assured of the championship on September 22nd, when Joe McGinnity beat the Reds. These are the dates the Giants clinched past pennants won under McGraw.

"THEY'RE SIXES," DECLARES JENNINGS

Detroit Manager Undecided as to Probable Winner of the World's Series.

Asked what he thought the outcome of the world's series would be, Hugh Jennings, manager of the Detroit Tigers, declared that it looked like an even thing.

"Being an American Leaguer, I would like to see the White Sox win the series," said Jennings, "but at the same time prejudice doesn't blind me to the fact that McGraw has a wonderful team. The Giants are strong at the bat, fast in the field, and have a splendid pitching staff. They also know how to play up-to-date ball. To win the world series they must beat Cioe, who, in my opinion, is one of the best pitchers we have seen in many years."

"The White Sox are game. They never quit, and they have played great ball all season. I believe that they are as strong as any team that ever has represented the American League in the world's series. They can hit all kinds of pitching, and their brilliant fielding is of valuable assistance to their pitchers."

"If Cioe beats the Giants in the first game, with Schupp opposing him, it will look like Chicago, but I understand that Schupp is one of the best left-handers ever developed in the National League. It is true that the White Sox have had considerable success against left-handed pitching this year, but it remains to be seen what they can do with Schupp, Sallee and Benton. If McGraw uses these men in regular order, in my opinion the breaks of the game will decide the question of supremacy. That is the only prediction that I dare to make at this time."

Practically all of the teams ordered in the junior series last season have announced their intention of again playing, and though it is somewhat early yet it is fully expected that more teams than last year will be in operation.

Chicago Backers Ask Odds. Only small bets have been made on the Broad Street curb, New York, on the world's series baseball games. About \$10,000 has been offered at even money on the Giants. Backers of the Chicago team are demanding odds of 7 to 10.
