

FIVE MINUTE LIMIT FOR CARS

Cars Should Not be Parked on **Princess Street For Hour** After Hour at a Time.

One of the greatest indications of the lack of automobile supervision in the city is the way that cars and other vehicles are allowed to be parked on Princess street. The Whig has been questioned about this on many occasions and recent acci-dents show that something ought to be done in this regard.

The rule in Toronto, Ottawa and in many other cities is that automobiles or other vehicles cannot be parked on business streets for longer than five minutes at a time. All other streets, beside those named as business streets, are considered residental streets (includes lanes, side streets, etc.) Cars may be parked

The Whig is desirous of having the best of traffic regulations here. If properly worded and enforced they work no hardship on any person but provide against many accidents and much inconvenience. To name Princess street from King to Barrie, as a business street and allowing no car to remain parked on it for more than five minutes would go far in removing a prevalent and danger
