WAYS OF SINKING U-BOATS

RECENT NAVAL ACTIONS IN WHICH MENACE WAS MET

Submarine Met Submarine—A Torpedo Gunboat Drops Explosives Aboard With Apparent Effect.

London, Oct. 2.—Another series of thrilling reports of recent naval actions against German submarines, illustrative of the manner in which the U-boat menace is being met, was given out last night by the Admiralty. The records are official and authenticated, but no dates are given.

The statement begins by reciting how a torpedo gunboat sighted a periscope 600 yards away and varied ship so that the periscope was travelling in the opposite direction to that in which it was first seen. When at a distance of 50 yards the periscope disappeared, and the gunboat, altering its course passed over the submarine.

The impact of the collision was felt and when the captain estimated that the submarine was under the after part of his ship explosive charges were dropped astern. A seaplane reported patches of oil on the surface and a mine-sweeper found an obstruction on the bottom at this point.

A torpedo boat patrolling in the Atlantic found a steamer torpedoed and sinking. The survivors were rescued, and then the torpedo boat circled about the locality for more than an hour. Finally a white patch of water was seen dead ahead.

The torpedo boat dashed over the spot, traced the submarine and dropped three submarine bombs. Oil and air bubbles reeking of gasoline came to the surface, and the mine-sweeper found another obstruction here.

The next encounter described in the statement was that of submarine against submarine. A British underwater boat sighted a German submarine while it was on the surface. The British submarine lived and later licked the enemy through the periscope. A torpedo, fired at 80 yards, caused a violent explosion in the German vessel.

WORK OF FORESTRY AND RAILWAY CORPS

Twelve New Companies of Former Now in France—About 8,000 Ry. Troops.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—The Militia Department has received a couple of interesting reports covering comparatively recent operations in France of the Canadian Railway and Forestry Corps. In regard to the latter it is stated that twelve new companies of the Canadian Forestry Corps have arrived in France, making a total of forty-two now in the country, with a total strength of 270 officers and 7,233 other ranks. These figures do not include the 2nd Canadian Construction Company (coloured), 11 officers and 42 other ranks. A very large quantity of mill machinery and logging equipment has been received.

The report states that the 6th Company, situated in the English army area, continues to increase its output. The production of the companies in this area proved of great value during the Vimy and Messines attacks. Large quantities of timber of all descriptions have been supplied for roads, dugouts, gun emplacements and similar operations.

Two newly-arrived Canadian forestry companies have been despatched to the French army area, where operations have commenced in a forest which was a short-time ago held by the enemy.

The report on the Canadian Railway troops states that during the month of July alone these forces located 82 miles of narrow gauge railway and 21 miles of wide gauge. In addition, they ballasted more than 100 miles of railway and kept other lines in repair. During the month nearly 300 miles of railway line was being maintained by this force, which number approximately 8,000 men.

STRUGGLE WILL END WHEN PEOPLE WAKE UP

The Huns Won't Fight on Realizing that the Submarines Have Failed.

Washington, Oct. 2.—The war will end shortly after the German people become convinced that the submarine cannot starve the Allies, according to the best opinion in Washington. Military experts of all nations who have been constantly conferring here, point out that as soon as all hope of a U-boat won war dies out and the war settles down to one of attrition even the junkers will not be able to persuade the German people that there is any hope of ultimate victory.

AUSTRALIAN WHEAT \$1.16

Lower Than Elsewhere in British Empire.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—Australia has put wheat and flour on the free list.

In a report received here from R. D. Ross, Canadian Trade Commissioner at Melbourne (dated Aug. 16), 150,000,000 bushels of wheat were said to be stacked in warehouses awaiting transportation overseas. The domestic price to the miller is \$1.16, probably lower than in any other part of the British Empire.

The placing of wheat and flour on the free list is to facilitate its transfer to the United States, either for shipment to Europe or to replace American flour shipped to the allies.

Flood at Moncton.

Moncton, N.B., Oct. 2.—Under a southwest gale the tide in the Petitcodiac River on Monday reached an almost unprecedented height. Dykes are down and the lower part of the city is flooded. It is the highest tide for twenty years at least. Great waves are sweeping across the high roads. The day express leaving Moncton got stalled at Sackville, N. B., with a washout on both sides. The Ocean Limited was stalled at Amherst.

BRITISH-BORN ARE PREDOMINANT IN WEST

Some Interesting Statistics Are Furnished of Racial Origins Out There.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—The racial origins of the people of the three prairie provinces are dealt with in a bulletin just issued by the Census Branch. The figures given deal with the situation as revealed in the census of June 1, 1916. The returns show that, of the population reported on that date, persons of British origin constituted 57.76 per cent in Manitoba, 54.5 per cent in Saskatchewan and 60.18 per cent in Alberta. The French race possessed 6.1 per cent of the population of Manitoba, and about 5 per cent of that of Saskatchewan and Alberta. Persons of German origin represented 4.67 per cent of the population of Manitoba, 11.9 per cent of Saskatchewan and 6.85 per cent of Alberta. Austro-Hungarians were 8.18 per cent of the population of Manitoba, 9.15 per cent in Saskatchewan and 6.37 per cent in Alberta. The numbers of Bulgarians and Turks are too small to be a factor in any of the provinces.

Males of the ages 20 to 24 numbered in Manitoba 33,118 Canadian-born, 21,608 born in the British Isles and 26,061 of foreign birth. In Saskatchewan the Canadian-born of this age numbered 58,865, the British-born 23,610 and the foreign-born 47,372. In Alberta the numbers were: Canadian-born, 23,671; British-born, 19,822; and foreign-born, 37,916.

GERMANY WANTS FRANCE TO BREAK WITH ALLIES

Says Allied Victory Means Triumph For Britain, America and Japan.

Paris, Oct. 2.—Fresh German manoeuvres whereby it is sought to create a division among the Entente Allies are pointed out by the Geneva correspondent of The Temps in a despatch to his paper. He quotes a person in the German diplomatic service as having declared recently:

"The war henceforth can lead to nothing but a triumph for Great Britain and its American and Japanese Allies. The interest of France, if well understood, would be to exploit the need for peace which manifests itself in Germany. She would thus succeed in getting back part of Lorraine. If not all of it, France and Lorraine, providing Germany was allowed a return out her territories in the direction of Russia."

LOST A HONEYMOON

Husband of Port Hope Woman Missing Three Weeks.

Vancouver, Oct. 2.—The mysterious disappearance of Livingston Hilton, a lawyer of Portland, Oregon, while on an automobile trip from Calgary to Seattle, is reported by Mrs. Hilton, who became the wife of Mr. Hilton, in Winnipeg, nearly three weeks ago. When last seen he left his wife to go to Seattle to bring his motor car into Canada. Mrs. Hilton is a former resident of Port Hope, Ont.

KAISER GIVES UP JEWELS

He and Empress Said to Have Turned Them Over to the State.

Amsterdam, Oct. 2.—The Zeitung Am Mittag of Berlin says the German Emperor and Empress have placed a large number of valuable jewels at the disposal of the Reichsbank, with instructions to use them to diminish Germany's obligations in foreign countries.

Military Matters

Capt. K. Millan, M.C., Royal Army Medical Corps, left on Monday for Toronto after visiting friends in the city.

W. E. Segsworth and T. B. Kidner, of Ottawa, and Prof. Haultain, of Toronto University, and W. W. Nichol, of Toronto, have been added to the vocational training branch of the Military Hospitals Commission. The appointments come through a change in policy on the part of the commission, who have decided that henceforth they will work hand in hand with the provincial governments in the re-education of wounded soldiers. Education comes within the jurisdiction of the provincial governments, hence probably the change.

Workmen are now engaged with a concrete mixer on the road over Barriehill Hill to the intersection of the Gananook and Ottawa roads. It has been decided that no work further than this point will be done, as the provincial highway will in probability be continued through the cut in Barriehill hill which was started when the causeway was being built.

A large party of returned soldiers were expected to arrive in the city on Tuesday morning, and a large crowd of people were at the station to welcome them. The party will arrive on Wednesday morning according to a later advice from Quebec.

Serjt. Roy Gibson, Alfred street, who left the city in the quartermaster's department of the 146th Battalion has arrived back in Canada according to a telegram received by his parents from Halifax on Saturday. He is expected in the city in a few days.

Major Crocker, senior battery commander of the depot batteries here has taken over an office in the building formerly used by the Infantry School. The major is in charge of the training, etc., of all the batteries.

Major Good and Capt. Randalls of the Vocational Branch of the Military Hospitals Commission are establishing vocational branches throughout the district so that returned men may be fitted for positions in civilian life.

Lieut. T. J. Flurey, who was on the Infantry School staff for some time is now in France.

According to the feeling in military circles the conscription to be called under the Military Service Act will have absolutely no opportunity of promotions. The officers ranks of the Depot Battalion have already been filled to overflowing by taking officers from the various draft companies which were raised in the district up to a few months ago. The N. C. O.'s positions are being taken by a class of men who enlisted for overseas service some time ago and are now qualifying for their rank at the Infantry School.

Everything is now ready to start the training of the men who will be called out. In view of the fact that only 2,000 are being called it is likely that exemptions on the first draft will be granted quite freely. As more men are called out later however the exemptions will be more strict. In any case there are perhaps 15,000 eligibles in the district and 2,000 men can be secured without in the least disturbing the commercial life of the district.

It is doubtful if conscripts under the Military Service Act will be in Canada very long after being called out. The "Kitchener Army" system of training now in use is of six to eight weeks duration. In that period the rawest civilian can be taught the elements of soldier life and it is understood that the military authorities do not intend to keep them in Canada any longer than absolutely necessary.

The Camp Engineer has made a report that it will take some three weeks to put the quarters in the city into shape for the reception of the soldiers of Barriehill Camp into winter barracks. It is probable that Barriehill Camp will remain in use until the first of November. In 1915 the camp was used until November 11th and with a late season this year there should be no special discomfort for the men in sleeping outdoors until the first of next month.

Going Into Shipbuilding.

Montreal, Oct. 2.—The Canadian Foundry and Forgings Company is going into the shipbuilding industry extensively, and contemplates purchasing the plant of the Delaney Iron and Forge Company, at Buffalo. The Canadian concern will operate in Buffalo as well as in Wexford.

Pte. W. Morgan Dies of Wounds.

Warkworth, Oct. 2.—Pte. Walter Morgan, formerly of Morganston, who was recently reported seriously wounded, has died of his wounds, according to a message received by his wife, who resides near Castleton. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Morgan, and went overseas in 1916.

Bar Added to Military Cross.

Cobourg, Oct. 2.—Lieut. Fred G. Johnston, son of Mrs. F. W. Johnston, of Toronto, formerly of Cobourg, has been awarded a bar to his Military Cross. Lieut. Johnston went overseas with the 30th Battery, C.F.A.

Brockville, Oct. 2.—On Saturday night George Wilkins a respected farmer in the township of Eketley, a mile east of Toledo, had an experience that he will not soon forget. On Saturday evening he went to Toledo village to make some purchases. He returned home after 9 o'clock and on going into the house stable on the farm he was suddenly pounced upon from behind by two men. His hands and feet were tied and a bag was placed over his head and fastened about the neck. The culprits then picked up Mr. Wilkins and threw him onto a vacant stall and left him there. They immediately vanished. Fortunately Mr. Wilkins' daughter Cynthia had noticed his return home and feeling uneasy that he had not returned to the house went to the stable and was horrified to find him in so dangerous a predicament. She released the imprisoned man and Dr. Bourne of Franklin, was called. He found Mr. Wilkins was suffering greatly from shock and complained of pains in the abdominal region. It is thought that when Mr. Wilkins was on the ground that one of the thugs trampled him. He cannot account for so outrageous an act as he does not know of any person holding vindictiveness against him.

DROWNED NEAR PERTH.

Wilfrid Cooper Upset Canoe While Fishing on Sunday.

Perth, Oct. 1.—A sad drowning accident occurred near here yesterday, when Wilfrid Cooper, a young man from Burgess township, lost his life by being upset out of a canoe on Mud Lake. He, with another youth, was fishing, and while trying to draw a fish on a casting rod, he swung around, losing his balance, and overturned the canoe. Being unable to swim, he sank without coming to the surface a second time. His companion managed to retain his hold on the overturned canoe, and after an exhausting struggle got on top of it and was drifted ashore.
