RUSH IN MONTREAL. To the Medical Board to be Examined. Montreal, Oct. 2.—So great is the rush of men of military age here to be examined by the Medical Board for the army that the headquarters on Union avenue have been found quite insufficient to accommodate the crowds, and a second board will be held to-day in the Craig Street Armories to relieve the pressure. Other boards will be established when the Government sends out the awaited proclamation with reference to the examinations. The percentage of French-Canadians applying for medical examination is increasing from day to day, and it is expected that when there is

an Examining Board in the east end of the city there will be a steady stream of French-speaking citizens to be examined. Buying Elevators. Winnipeg, Oct. 2.—The N. Hawlf Grain Company, Limited, has purchased five elevators from the Atlas Elevator Company, in the Yorkton district, on the G.T.P., for \$40,000; and also six elevators from the Imperial Elevator Company, on the C.P.R., in the Yorkton district, for \$12,000. This gives the N. Hawlf Grain Company, Limited, an elevator in all the good oat districts in Saskatchewan and brings their full line of elevators up to ninety.
