

## TO FOLLOW IN PATH OF "OLD CHIEFTAIN."

Declares For "Win-the-War" and Laurier as Only Course to Save Country.

Toronto, Oct. 3 .- Sir Alan Aylesworth has come out with a strong declaration for Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberal chieftain's course on the conscription issue on the war. The only son of Sir Alan is at the front, and the former Canadian minister of justice pledges himself as a Britisher, who wishes to adopt the most effective means of bringing speedy reinforcements to the boys in the trenches, but who believes th only way in which Canada can prosecute the war vigorously and with full force is to consult the people of the nation on the conscription issue. He points to the fact that the Borden Government claimed that time prevented a referendum, but months have elapsed since the policy was announced by Str Robert Bor-

He points to the case of Ireland. and indirectly to Quebec, and sees grave danger to the future of the country. 
