## TWENTY-ONE FORGERIES

CHEQUES STOLEN FROM LOCAL OFFICER IN CIRCULATION.

Merchants Are Warned Not to Accept "Militia Department" Cheques When Presented by Unknown People.

Twenty-one cheques, which are issued to unknown values, are now in the community in circulation under forged signatures. The cheques are of the Department of Militia and Defence.

The military authorities have been for some time urging the merchants not to cash their cheques unless in exceptional cases where the men who asks the favor is very well known. The practice has become very common, however, and various losses are recorded.

Recently in one of the units here the officer in command lost twenty-one cheques when someone tore that number out of his book. These have undoubtedly been filled in and cashed. The officer had made a sworn statement that he did not sign the cheques which have already been used up or any of those missing from the books. With suspicion of a mistake removed from the officer, the Militia Department is taking steps to secure the arrest of the man who did the forging. In the meantime a warning is issued to all merchants not to cash the Militia Department cheques when presented by unknown parties.

### MAN IN SAD PLIGHT

Walked Around City Minus His Coat Hat and Boots.

Minus his hat, coat and boots, a man about sixty-five years of age, called at the police station late on Wednesday night, and asked for shelter, and was accommodated.

It was learned on Thursday morning, that the man's mind had become unbalanced, and that he had slipped out of his home unaware to the members of his family, and after walking around the streets, had gone to the police station. His case is now under investigation.

## Military News

Yesterday afternoon's steady downpour of rain stopped all chances of sports, and the men therefore had the afternoon off. Quite a number spent the fine writing or playing cards, games, etc.

Last evening the boys in camp came in large numbers to see the motion picture show at the "Y." A good programme was on the boards, no less than three plays being run off, and every one a splendid number.

"It is published for the information of the concerned that all members of the Canadian expeditionary force who return to Canada, whether on duty or otherwise, automatically come under the immediate control in matters of discipline, etc., of the military authorities in Canada."

"Officers, non-commissioned officers and men who are on furlough, and all others who for reasons are not attached to any particular unit in Canada are directly responsible to the general officer commanding the district in which they are, and he is to be considered for all purposes of discipline as their commanding officer."

With the idea of establishing evening classes for returned men if the interest among the men is kept enough, letters have been sent to vocational training officers of the Military Hospitals Commission here directing them to enquire into the matter, and report the number of men who would avail themselves of the privilege in the district if the arrangements were made.

While the bulk of the men returning take advantage of the assistance offered them by the commission it is known that there are many men independently by nature and full of initiative who found positions in spite of disabilities, who might be eager to take advantage of evening classes to advance themselves. It is to help these men who help themselves that the scheme of evening classes is suggested.
