ONE OF GREATEST VICTORIES SINCE THE MARNE WAS FOUGHT

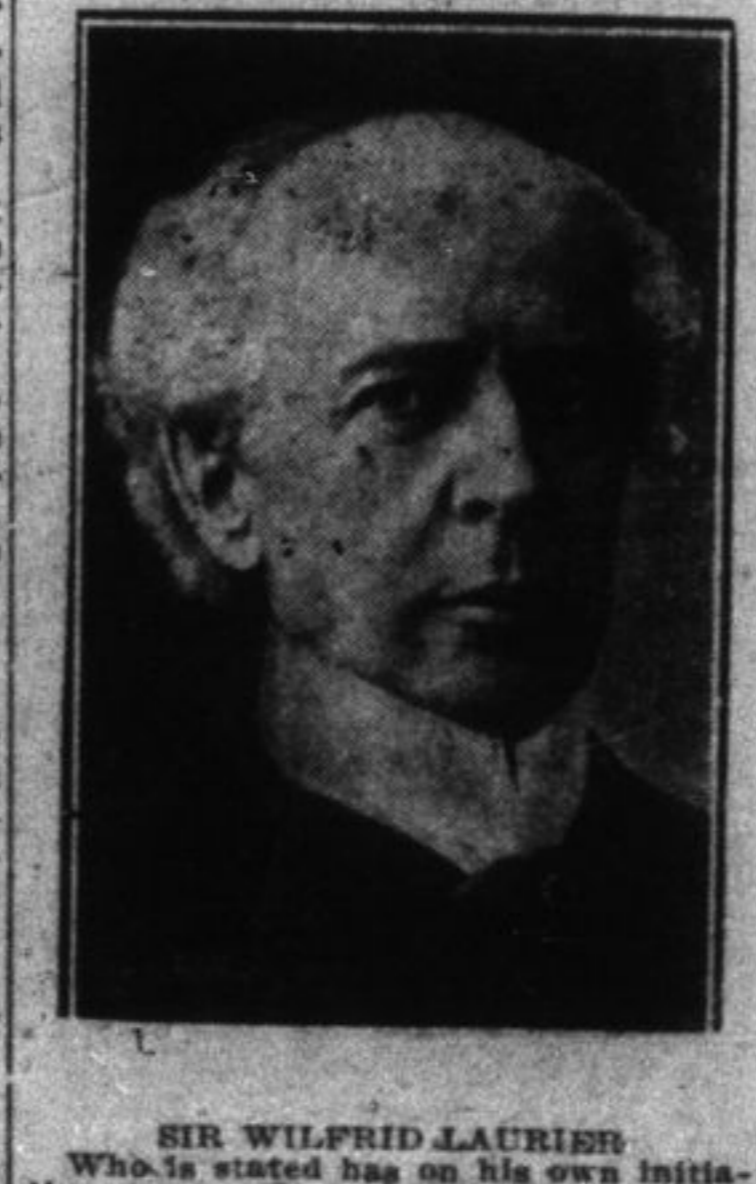
