**INCIDENTS OF THE DAY**

**MEDICAL BOARD AT RECRUITING OFFICE TO WORK EVENINGS**  
Have Examined 328 Men to Date—Open in Evenings to Accommodate Labor Element.  
The work of the three officers Capt. Coghlin, Capt. Box, M.C., Capt. Buck of the medical board at the Base Recruiting Office has become so heavy it has been decided to have the board work in the evenings.  
In a very few days since the announcement was made there have been over 300 men appear before the board. Each has been subjected to a most thorough examination by the three doctors and after determining his efficiency as a soldier the soldier containing all the details is filled in. The work requires much patience, time and experience.  
To keep up with the demand for examinations the board will now sit from seven to ten o'clock every evening. The hours will be from nine until twelve in the morning, two until five in the afternoon and then the evening session.  
The decision to remain open after the usual closing hours was made when it became known that many laborers were unable to leave their work and that the hours of the board were inconvenient. To accommodate these men only the doctors will spend their evenings at the Recruiting Office.  
There was a total of 328 men examined up to Monday morning and these were divided up into the following classes: "A" Class 197; "B" Class 21; "C" Class 38; "E" Class 72.

**FIFTY CENTS FOR STALE EGGS.**  
Citizen Got "Stung" on the Market on Saturday.  
A Whig representative met a citizen on Saturday night, who was pretty hot under the collar, about a purchase he had made on the market. He paid fifty cents for a dozen of eggs, and found a number of them were stale.  
"It is a high price to pay for eggs," he said, "but when you do pay such a price it is a shame to have some of them bad. The woman I bought them from declared that they were all fresh—that they had been laid during the week, but there were some which evidently had been laid in the month of September, and probably longer than that. I think there should be some law to protect the man in the city. When a farmer gets fifty cents for strictly fresh eggs they should be fresh. The citizen who is making the purchase has to depend on the honesty of the person selling, and in this way is right up against it."
