Breweries For Cold-Storage.

In Ontario there are several breweries standing idle or run part-time to make temperance beer, under the maximum of 21/2 per cent, alcohol We have one in Windsor and one in Walkerville. What is to become of these plants? Must they be closed, with the consequent loss to owners, or is there no compercial use to which they can be put? One suggestion that the Record puts forward is to utilize them for cold-storage, perhaps, under an arrangement with civic or Government authorities. The two breweries here as a cold-storage for meat and fish, as well as other products. A slaughter-house might also be operated as part of the proposition, and, instead of sending live stock raised in this vicinity to the East to be slaughtered and then sent back, it could be done here in the proper manner, and the meat given refrigerator treatment, as it should

Storing the Winter's Vegetables, Louise Wilder in Good Housekeeping. If your potatoes have not yet been harvested, get them in at opce; your dried beans will not be injured by freezing, but they must be kept dry. Apples keep best at a temperature of about 35, degrees, but pears require a slightly warmer storage place; both will keep much longer if packed with the stems on. Ripe, solid, unbruised bunches of grapes may be packed in boxes of clean, dry sawdust or sand for early winter use; cool them for several hours in the celtar before packing. When your

MASSENA GIRL MURDERED Body Found by Workmen at New High School Building.

Massena, N.Y., Oct. 6 .- While an nquest was being held in the case; of Bessia White, murdered on the grounds of the new Massena High School Wednesday night, twenty officers under command of Deputy Chief Stubbs of the Massena police were rounding up every negro and foreigner in the village.

Miss White was killed shortly after nine o'clock. The body was found on Thursday morning by a workman under a temporary walk near the new high school near the centre of the business section of the village.
She was apparently attacked while passing the school grounds. Residents near the school heard cries about nine o'clock but failed to make an investigation.

The only mark on the body was a cut and contusion upon the forehead, apparently made by a blunt instrument.

The murdered girl from traces at the scene of the crime must have put up a hard fight for ife. She was fully capable of taking care of an ordinary assailant, the officers says being powerful and weighing fully

The police, therefore, aided by District Attorney Dolan of Gouveneur, who is in charge of the case, are ooking for a man who shows marks of the encounter.
