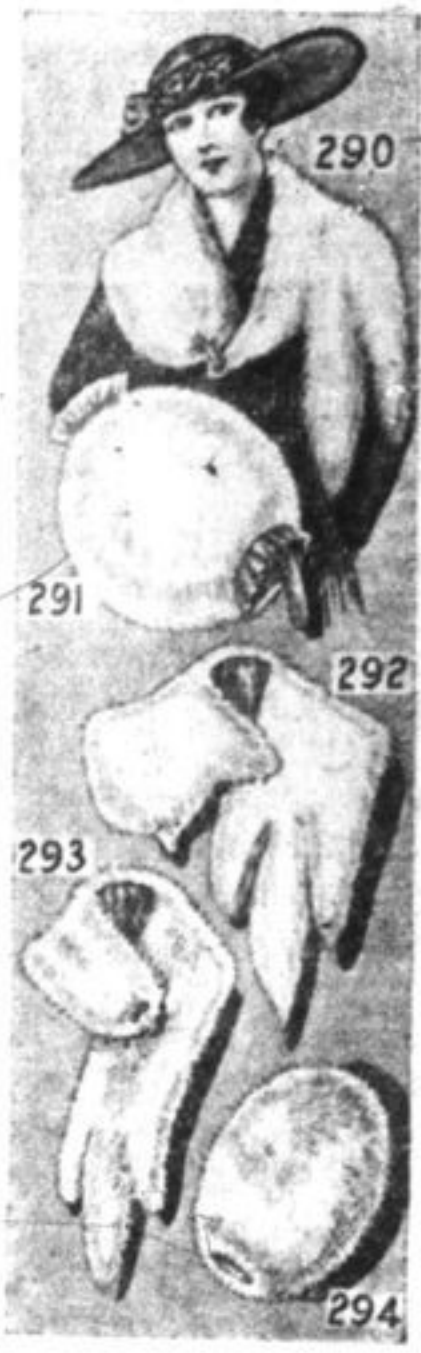

AN AMERICAN EMPLOYED

WAR VETERANS DECLARE DISTRICT REGISTRAR OFFENDS. Has An American of Military Age on His Staff—Other Business Discussed at Friday Evening's Meeting.

A meeting of the Great War Veterans Association was held on Friday evening in the association rooms opposite the Base Recruiting Office. There were ten new members accepted. The already large membership has made these quarters altogether too small for their purpose. The house committee will make an effort to secure larger quarters.

The veterans wish to have returned soldiers appointed to the various Exemption Tribunals throughout the district and are asking the Dominion secretary treasurer to have this done. It was stated by some of the members that a man of military age and who up to less than a month ago was an American citizen is being employed in an important position in the office of the District Registrar at Ontario Hall. Inquiries will be made and action taken.

Auditing of the books of the association was decided on at the meeting on Friday evening and auditors for the purpose will make an examination of the books every month. A social evening for returned men will be held on Monday evening in the rooms.
