VESSELS TIED UP AGAIN BY STORM BOTH ON THE RIVER AND THE LAKE.

Mariners State That the Conditions on the River Were the Worst Ever Experienced.—Tug Smith Came up Through the Storm. Wednesday was a bad day for the mariners on both the lakes and rivers. Mariners state that the biggest sea they ever experienced held full sway on the river all day. On the lake there was a very heavy gale. It was reported that practically every boat was tied up.

The tug Smith of the Montreal Transportation Company made the trip up from Montreal with three light barges in the storm, and had a most trying time, but was able to pull through all right. It looked at times as if the barges would be lost, but good management on the part of the men in charge of the tug and the barges pulled through all right.
