ORPHANS' HOME ANNUAL

A HOME BOY WHO FELL IN BATTLE LEFT A LEGACY.

OF \$137 to the Institution—The Number of Children Decreased Owing to Prohibition and the Patriotic Fund.

The annual meeting of the Orphans' Home Association was held in the home on Friday afternoon. In the absence of Mayor Hughes, J. M. Farrell took the chair. Rev. F. C. A. Whalley offered prayer. Mr. Farrell expressed his deep sympathy with the Orphans' Home, referring to the fact that in his capacity as police magistrate he had come to realize the tremendous amount of good which was being accomplished by the ladies. He was sympathetic towards the children and their condition in life and truly appreciated the efforts being made to better their conditions.

The children of the institution had been gathered in the class room in which the meeting was held, and sang patriotic songs.

The corresponding secretary, Mrs. H. C. Nickle, read her report, which proved very interesting. The staff regretted the retirement of Miss Wilder as a teacher, as she had done excellent work and kept the classes in the lead against the other city schools.

The number of children to be cared for, according to Mrs. Nickle's report, had greatly decreased, due to prohibition and the patriotic fund, the latter providing money for many mothers to better care for their offspring. The Children's Aid Society had also been successful in placing numbers of the children in suitable homes.

Mrs. Nickle mentioned the fact that Edward Cole, a home boy, who had fallen in France, left his estate valued at \$137, to the home. The late Mr. Robertson had also left \$2,000 to the home.

The Greater Production movement of lower Gordon street had been very successful, furnishing sixty-five bushels of potatoes and many other vegetables. The chicken venture was also turning out well. The treasurer, Mrs. Garrett, read her report, which showed that there was a balance of \$49.95 on hand.

Following the verbal report of Mrs. H. Moore, registrar, who said that 123 children had passed through the home during the past year, addresses were given by Rev. J. W. Stephen, Rev. W. T. G. Brown and Rev. F. C. A. Whalley. The program closed by the children singing various anthems and the National Anthem.

OLD SEAMAN DIES

James Delaney Was Well Known On Lake Ontario.

The death occurred at Port Credit recently of James Delaney, aged seventy-seven years, who had been forty years a resident of the village. Twenty-seven years ago he retired from the active life of a seaman on the Great Lakes.

He was a native of Whitehaven, Cumberland, England, where he served his apprenticeship, afterwards going to the southern sea, in those days a three years' voyage. He was ship-wrecked on the English coast, and again off the coast of Anticosti, after twenty-five years of seafaring. He came to Canada and settled the Queen of the Lakes, Mary Grover, the large Cecilia, and the schooner Dundee.
