AMHERST ISLAND RED CROSS

The Work That Has Been Done Since August 8th.

Fowler, \$24.20; Mrs. Neilson paid in later, \$8; Sept. ice cream social, \$20.63; lunch on fair day made, \$49.21; received from T. Cochrane, (dance) \$6; J. Glen, \$3; Mr. McQuinn, \$3; Mrs. Kerr, \$5; William Morrow, \$1; Mrs. H. Sandwith for oblique roller, \$2.50.

A good many gave money to help furnish the good things that were put in the thirty-six Christmas boxes that have been packed and sent to the boys overseas. The boxes cost on an average, without postage of about \$3.25 each. There is another shipment of socks about ready to send off.

TEN MILLION YEARS AGO IN CANADA

PROF. CHARLES D. WALCOTT, of the Smithsonian Institute, has discovered a deposit of extremely valuable fossils of early marine life on Mount Field, overlooking Emerald Lake Chateau and the beautiful Yoho Valley in the Canadian Pacific Rockies. Far up over Burgess Pass, at an altitude of nine thousand feet, where the tourists in the fashionable summer hotels and camps can barely hear the boom of the blasts as he quarries down to the fossil bearing shale, the professor has been securing some wonderful specimens of sea life of over ten million years ago. These are of the period when life was just emerging from the jelly-fish stage into an era where a bony structure was becoming apparent. Dying, they were deposited in the mud of the ocean bottom that has since hardened into rock and been raised to the snow-capped mountain top.

The strata of fossil-bearing rock discovered by Professor Walcott is of much earlier age than any in the surrounding mountains, and has, he says, been pushed up over the newer formations for a distance over twenty-five miles. The fossils were discovered by Prof. Walcott while travelling over Burgess Pass, a peculiar formation in a piece of shale attracting his attention. He followed up the shale slide almost to the top of Mount Field, and finally located its source, far above the timber line. The workings are very peculiar, because of their height, and are probably the only ones of their kind in the world. Some of the specimens taken out are so perfect that Prof. Walcott has been able to determine what they ate just before they were buried in the mud over ten million years ago.
