At the meeting of the Alma Mater Society on Saturday night the question of the annual elections was thoroughly discussed, but the matter was left over for a week until there should be a more representative attendance of the students. The secretary, however, was instructed to write to the Levens Society to ascertain whether they were going to run a ticket or contest for only a few offices.

J. M. Hazlett, in presenting the report of the athletic committee, stated that the auditor had reported that there would be a deficit of several hundred dollars to meet as a result of there being no sports this autumn. The committee hopes to meet this by fixing a rental for the finance and estates committee of the university to pay for the use of the students' gymnasium in their compulsory physical training classes.

Sermon by Prof. Welsh.

Rev. Prof. Welsh, of Montreal, was the speaker at the Sunday afternoon service in Convocation Hall, and in an address, forceful and clear, he urged that singleness of purpose should be the aim in life. It was an address pregnant with messages for the college student, and coming at a time when the Scotchman seriously and emphatically made a distinct impression on the minds of his hearers.

It was a fundamental purpose behind all their activities that the university students needed, he said, to carry them to the goals to which they wished to attain. Honor, honesty, truth brought from a contact and faith with the Saviour should mark their efforts, and they would reach the pinnacles of success. Too often in these days men are showing traits of duplicity and double-crossing which in the end serve no purpose. It is the man who has the living, ever-present faith and who aims with a single purpose to reach his desired goal that is the most successful and revered man in the business life.

LIEUT. LYALL R. ROBERTSON.

Son of Late Dr. John Robertson, Ottawa, Falls in Action.

Another young life full of promise has been exacted in the increasing roll of war victims. Lieut. Lyall Robertson, eldest son of the late Dr. John Robertson, Ottawa, and a grandson of the late Capt. Lewis Middleton, of Kingston, who was killed in action in France on October 26th.

The late officer was a representative of a fine, virile type of manhood, and was twenty-eight years of age. At the outbreak of war he was acting as teller in the Standard Bank in Ottawa, but with the first roll of the drums his patriotism was stirred, and he immediately enlisted as a sergeant in the Army Service Corps.

He served with this unit in the first days at Valcartier Camp, and later in the mud at Salisbury Plains. For two and a half years he served with the lines of communication in France, and then returned to England, where he took the officers' training course, qualifying for the rank of lieutenant. He was attached to the 21st Reserve Battalion as a staff officer, but afterwards transferred to the 50th Battalion for active service. He returned to France about a week ago, and it was with this unit that he was serving when death relieved him of his duties.

The deceased is survived by his mother, Mrs. John Robertson, Ottawa; one sister, Marie, and two younger brothers, Charles and William. The latter will leave for overseas shortly for service with the Royal Naval Air Service. Mrs. John Henderson, Clergy street, is a sister of the late officer's mother.

Farquhar Fraser's Supreme Sacrifice.

Mrs. D. M. Fraser, Albert street, was officially notified on October 24th that her son, Bombarrier Farquhar Caldwell Fraser, Canadian Artillery, was killed accidentally in France on October 11th. She received a letter from him only the day before, which stated that he had been kept busy almost night and day for the last month, but had now been promoted to corporal and would have more time at his disposal.

The following letter, dated Oct. 12th, giving particulars of the accident, has been received by his mother from Capt. Norman Macaulay, O.C. 52nd Battery:

"Dear Mrs. Fraser—By the time this reaches you, you will have received the sad news of your son's death. He was killed by the explosion of a fuse, and death was instantaneous. One other man who was standing near was badly wounded. Your son was not splintered in the head and chest. I am giving you these details because I know it will be some comfort to you to know just what happened. To-day I have been to his funeral. He is buried in a Canadian cemetery and his grave has been recorded. Our brigade chaplain conducted the service. Your son was one of the most efficient men in the battery, and I have no doubt that he would have attained much higher rank. He had just been promoted to corporal for some good work he had done in connection with building a new position. He was very highly esteemed by both officers and men of the battery, and his loss is very keenly felt, not only because he was an efficient soldier but because of his happy and cheerful disposition under trying circumstances."

Weather Notes.
