WOMEN ARE EXPOSED TO SHELL FIRE
More German Brutality in Belgium is Revealed by a Boche's Letter.

British Front in Belgium, Nov. 6.—Belgium women and girls are being compelled to build concrete dug-outs under artillery fire.

The statement that this form of slavery actually has been practiced is recorded in the diary of a German soldier who was captured recently. He belonged to a Landwehr division and was in charge of a large number of these unfortunate Belgians, who were herded together and daily taken to a zone near the German lines to perform manual labor of the hardest kind in constant danger of death.

Blouse of Very Chic Design.

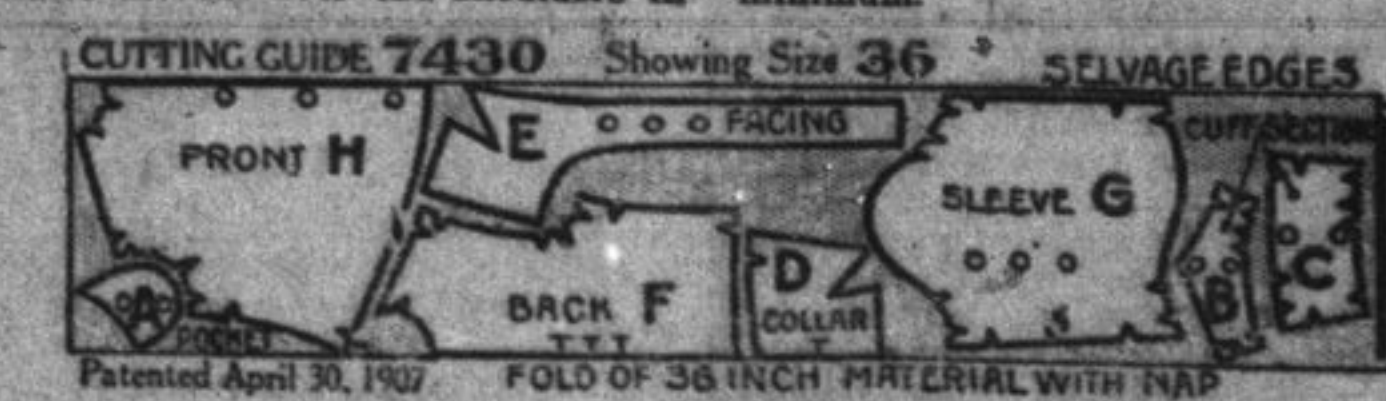
Making its bow among the modes for Autumn is this chic satin blouse trimmed with crepe Georgette. Inserted pockets trim the fronts.

The plain satin blouse makes its Autumn bow in some very chic forms, with smartly applied touches of contrasting material. The design shown here is in dark blue, with cuffs and turn-over of the collar of tan crepe Georgette. The back of the waist extends over the shoulders in

yoke effect, the front being attached to it. If preferred, the collar may be rolled in low effect with the front of the waist. Inserted pockets trim the front of the waist. In medium size the waist requires 3 1/2 yards 36-inch satin, with 1/4 yard crepe Georgette for trimming.

The cutting guide is provided for the assistance of home sewers who have not had much experience in making their own clothes and, if followed faithfully, mistakes and waste of material will be avoided. First take the satin and fold it in half on a smooth surface. If there is not a sewing table convenient, the material may be placed on the floor. First place into position front of the blouse, with large "O" perforations on a lengthwise thread of material. To the right of the front lay the facing and below the facing, place the back and collar, with triple "TTT" perforations resting on the lengthwise fold. Three pieces of the pattern remain now, and there will be just enough material for them. First take the sleeve and cut it into two sections. The large "O" perforations in each piece are laid on a lengthwise thread of material.

The high necked blouses may not be as comfortable as the low necked models, but they are constantly growing in favor. The fitting of a high collar is no small problem, but if made with care from a correct model, the risks are reduced to a minimum.

Her father, the late Aleck McRae, died in July last. The funeral will be held on Monday.

The funeral of the late Andrew Robinson, who passed away after a long illness on Thursday morning, took place Saturday morning from his late residence. Rev. Mr. Beckwith conducted the service. The late Mr. Robinson was widely known and esteemed. For many years he was a cattle and grain buyer here, and always took a very deep interest in all sports. THE LATE JAMES LEEDER.

The Passing of an Aged Resident of Mallorytown.

Mallorytown, Nov. 2.—Amid the peaceful stillness of the Sabbath evening death claimed one of the oldest and most respected residents of Mallorytown, in the person of James Leeder. Deceased was in his eighty-fourth year, and was widely known and greatly respected by all classes of people in Leeds county. Until about two weeks ago he was in his usual good health, when he contracted a cold which developed into pneumonia, which resulted in his death. He was born at Montost Mills, where he spent a number of years of his life, after which he was a resident successively of Caintown and Mallorytown. In 1861 he married Amanda Brown, who predeceased him five years ago.

He leaves to mourn his loss two sons, J. J. Leeder, of Ballycrae, and Angus, of Prescott, also three daughters, Mrs. Malcolm Andress, of Yonge Mills; Mrs. Ira Andress, of Mallorytown; and Mrs. David Townsend, of Long Point. Also several surviving grandchildren, Joseph Leeder, of Ballycrae. There is also a long line of descendants consisting of twenty-six grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Mr. Leeder will be greatly missed, as he took an active interest in all things pertaining to the welfare of the country. He was active in political life, and was a life long Conservative. The large funeral procession started from the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ira Andress, and proceeded to St. Luke's Church, in Ballycrae. The pallbearers were his six nephews, Robert J. Leeder, George Leeder, Dave Leeder, James Leeder, Stanley Leeder and Thomas Leeder. After the service at the church the remains were placed in the vault at Ballycrae to await interment later in the family plot.

Jesse Snider had the good luck to shoot and kill three bears already this fall. The open season for killing deer commences to-day, and most of our settlers and citizens have been preparing for it. A number of outside sportsmen have also arrived, and are again occupying their hunting camps or visiting their relatives or friends here. Among the latter are Mr. and Mrs. F. Chatson's; their sons, Fred, of Renfrew; Frank, of Brockville, and James, of Saskatchewan. At Mr. and Mrs. Max Mieske's their sons, Eugene and Leopold, from Renfrew county, and at E. Berndt's Mr. Hawley from Napanee. The Denbigh cheese factory closed this season's operations yesterday, and Thomas Love, the popular cheese maker, left for his home in Matawan. Cattle dealers have lately been very busy taking away the cattle and sheep purchased by them in this vicinity. The prices paid by them this season were very satisfactory.
