### VICTORY LOAN TERMS ARE WELL RECEIVED

The Issue of Bonds at Par Meets With General Favor.

The terms of the Victory Loan issue announced by Sir Thomas White from Ottawa are coming in for a good deal of favorable comment from all quarters. The issue of the bonds at par is generally regarded as a step in the right direction and should materially help to keep the price steady after the issue has been placed.

A considerable number of inquiries are being received from day to day from small investors regarding the small denomination bonds which are being offered, and a great many subscriptions are expected to these debentures. The particularly attractive terms upon which the issue is offered involving only a few dollars down and spreading the payments over five months, makes it possible for almost any householder to subscribe for one or more of the smaller bonds.

A thorough canvass will be made of every wage-earner in the city and throughout the Dominion, and a genuine effort made to get all to subscribe. The large denomination bonds are expected to be popular in the west where the fruitful harvest will give the farmers large sums of money to invest.
