Montreal, Nov. 9 .- Henri Bourassa makes clear in his paper, Le Devoir, the possible attitude of the Nationalist forces in the coming

In the first of a series of articles in which Bourassa will study Sir Wilfrid's manifesto, the Nationalist leader writes: "Although weak and little reassuring for the future, Laurier's attitude is better than the radically bad politics of the Borden

"Unwavering adversaries of coalition, of all its politics and of all its members, we (the Nationalists), accept Sir Wilfrid Laurier's gramme in the measure where it meets our principles and ideals; we reject it everywhere it agrees virtually with the Cabinet's platform. are willing to help Laurier to throw down the Government of national treason, but we want him to surround himself and his party with barriers high and strong enough to keep out the bandits of the Northcliffe-Sifton type."

Bourassa, before coming to this conclusion, says he is surprised that Laurier, a "real respectable man" ranks, and for every one of them he has an epithet.

It was a very able address and showed that while there had been a more widespread promulgation of socialistic thought and doctrine since the war had started, the formation of definite socialist parties had been less widespread.






