MAY PUT TURKEY OUT OF THE WAR

The Clean-Cut Victories of the British Threaten Turkish Armies.

BIG RACE NOW DEVELOPED

BETWEEN BRITAIN AND GERMANY FOR THE GOAL.

It Looks As If Britain Would Force Turkey Out of the Central Alliance Before Germany Can Possibly Overcome Italy.

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, Nov. 10.—Gen. Allenby's coup in Palestine threatens to cut off the whole of the Turkish forces operating in that theatre, and give the British one of the most decisive victories of the entire war. By capturing Gaza, Gen. Allenby has accomplished one of the most brilliant manoeuvres recorded in the fighting in the Near East. His forceful methods of debouching his men across the desert in night marches, and completing an encircling movement which placed his armies to the rear of the Turks, marks the beginning of an intense campaign.

The result plainly may be to force Turkey out of the war, which is entirely possible, as her Palestine armies are in an extremely dangerous position. Their line of communication is maintained through a narrow strip of country with British troops threatening it on both sides. It can be stated flatly that the British troops will not spare any effort to win a clean-cut victory and wipe out the previous history of their fighting with the Turks, especially the Kut affair. Furthermore, with Germany going against Italy with furious energy, and with the intention of knocking her from among the Entente Allies, the British have the more reason for pushing against the Turks. They have the better chance of sending the Turks from the central alliance than Germany has of accomplishing a similar purpose with Italy. According to the best evidence the campaigns are developing into a great race between Great Britain and Germany to see which can attain its goal first.

News has not arrived yet in regard to the most vital part of the operations, which included a swift move from Beersheba to the coast. Nothing could have been more timely than Allenby's stroke, as it will relieve the depression due to Italy's plight. The whole plan apparently meets the full approval of the Allied strategists, who already have accomplished wonders in arranging to help hard-pressed Italy.

QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY NOTES.

Establishment of the C. O. T. C. Has Been Authorized.

A Bad Week For Hun Subs

London, Nov. 10.—"It was a good week for us and a bad one for the German submarines," was the comment made today in high naval quarters regarding the greatly reduced losses to merchantmen. While there is no indication of the number of U-boats destroyed, there was a suggestion that it was considerably above the previous weekly average.

PTE. JOHN CAMPBELL ALIVE.

Reported That Former Green Bay Young Man Had Been Killed.

Pte. John Campbell, son of the late William Campbell, of Green Bay, who was reported killed, is alive and now with his unit in the trenches. He enlisted in Kindsley, Sask., on April 15th, 1916, in the 20th Battalion, and went overseas on the 4th of November the same year. Later he was transferred to the 52nd Battalion. He was wounded on June 28th last, and also on Sept. 4th, but recovered both times and is in the fight once more. Corp. A. Kish and his brother were gassed, and the latter died two days later. The former is recovering.

KINGSTON GOLF CLUB.

Shareholders Confirmed Taking Over of New Links and By-Laws.

A meeting of the shareholders of the Kingston Golf Club was held in the Board of Trade rooms on Friday night, when the recent action in taking over the new links and the new by-laws were confirmed. The shareholders were well pleased with the conditions and the outlook for the coming season, when nine holes will be ready for play. Senator H. W. Richardson is president of the club, and J. Hunter is secretary. The directors are A. B. Cunningham, G. S. Hague, T. J. Rigney and F. C. Stevenson.

Increased Price of Bread.

As announced in yesterday's Whig the bakers of the city have decided to raise the price of bread from 9c to 11c. They point out that Kingstons for the past year has been getting bread cheaper than most any other place in the Dominion, the bakers being enabled to do this because they had flour contracts at the old rates and thus gave to their customers the advantage of low buying. Now that they have to pay the higher rates and can only obtain flour on certain restricted terms, they find it absolutely necessary to raise the price of bread. They point out that the new prices charged are as reasonable as are to be found anywhere in the Dominion.

AN ARMISTICE NOW PROPOSED

New Russian Regime Would Discuss Peace Terms With Civilization's Enemy.

PETROGRAD ABOUT NORMAL

KERENSKY FLED TOWARDS MOSCOW ON WEDNESDAY LAST.

British Minister of Blockade Still Has Faith in Russia and Believes She Will Abide by Her Pledges to the Allies.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Petrograd, Nov. 10.—The Bolshevik regime proposes three months' armistice while peace terms are being arranged with Germany. Petrograd is almost normal today with the new revolutionary Government in full control and maintaining practically complete order. Change from the Kerensky Provisional Government to the new Bolshevik regime was accomplished practically without bloodshed, despite the fact that for a time there was vigorous resistance and Petrograd was once again filled with the sounds of firing.

Kerensky's escape from the Maximists was due to the fact that he left Petrograd on Wednesday for the front, expecting to meet troops which he had previously summoned to the capital. The former Premier had anticipated a clash with the Bolsheviks and had detached a number of units to meet this body of troops when he received word of the Bolshevik successes and immediately fled toward Moscow.

Has Faith in Russia.

London, Nov. 10.—"I will continue to believe Russia will abide by her honorable pledges, until I am convinced to the contrary," declared Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of Blockade, this afternoon. The statement was in answer to a question as to the possibility of Russia making a separate peace.

Lenine Acting Premier.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Petrograd, Nov. 10.—The all Russian congress of Workmen's and Soldiers' delegates is reported unofficially to have named a cabinet composed of Bolsheviks, and then adjourned. The cabinet is headed by Nikolai Lenine as Premier and Leon Trotsky holds the post of foreign minister. The cabinet will serve until the constituent assembly approves or selects a new one.

THE BRITISH ATTACK NEAR PASSCHENDAELE

Storm German Positions—Good Progress is Being Made, Reports Say.

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, Nov. 10.—The British made an attack this morning on the Flanders front near Passchendaele. The announcement follows: At sunrise this morning our troops attacked German positions north-west and north of Passchendaele. The first reports indicate that good progress was made. The weather is stormy with heavy rain and high wind.

French Repulse German Attacks.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Paris, Nov. 10.—German troops undertook a series of advances last night against French positions, north-west of Rheims, but were repulsed by the French.

BRITISH ARE ON THE TOP OF THE RIDGE

They Smashed Ahead For Many Yards in Belgian Territory.

(Canadian Press Despatch) British Front in Belgium, Nov. 10.—The British troops which attacked this morning in Passchendaele area were reported, at an early hour, to have battled their way forward as much as eight hundred yards at some points. The British passed many strongly fortified farms north and north-west of Goeborg. At this point they were fighting nearly half a mile from their jumping off place. The line was pushed northward along Passchendaele Ridge almost to the point at which the highest crest starts sloping downward. Today's operations were carried out on a 2,500 yard front for limited objective, which had been virtually all gained by ten o'clock.

Asigo Captured.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Berlin, Nov. 10.—Austro-German forces, which are invading Northern Italy, have reached the Piava river. Asigo has been captured.

POLITICAL PEACE IS RESTORED IN BERLIN

The New Cabinet Means Virtually a Coalition Liberal Government.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Berlin, Nov. 10.—(via London).—Dr. Karl Helfferich, the vice-chancellor, has capitulated and political peace once more has been restored. The cabinet, containing Count Von Hertling as chancellor, Friedrichs Von Payer as vice-chancellor, and Herr Friedberg as vice-president of the Prussian Ministry, means virtually a coalition Liberal Government. The Clerical, National, Liberal and Progressive parties are represented actively in the cabinet. The Liberals are now getting ready to combat the neo-reactionaries in their efforts to obstruct the enactment of the Prussian electoral reform bill.

HON. DR. SPROULE DEAD.

Senator, Ex-Speaker and Head of the Orange Order.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Markdale, Nov. 10.—Hon. T. S. Sproule, M.D., member of the Senate and formerly Speaker of the House of Commons and head of the Orange Order in Ontario, died here today. Dr. Sproule was seized with intestinal trouble last night and passed away early today. Mrs. Sproule and one daughter survive. Mrs. Turner of Salt Lake City. The late Senator was born on Oct. 25th, 1843 in the township of King, north York. He was generally recognized as the leader of the Orange forces in Parliament.

BOMB FRENCH HOSPITAL.

German Aviators Kill Seven and Wound Nine.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Paris, Nov. 10.—German aviators last night dropped bombs on a French hospital at Suedcoote, a department of the Nord, killing seven persons and wounding nine. Dunkirk was again bombarded, six casualties resulting.

GERMANY PRESENTS POLAND TO AUSTRIA

But Polish Paper Warns Teutons Against Any Parceling of Their Nation.

Amsterdam, Nov. 10.—According to a Berlin telegram to the Local Anzeiger, the Council of Ministers solved the Polish question according to Austrian wishes. Emperor Charles receives the title of King of Poland. Poland will be attached to Austria. Galicia and Courland will probably fall to Prussia. The King of Prussia will receive the title of Grand Prince of Lithuania and Duke of Courland. The Cracow Conservative Czes, chief organ of the Galician Nobles party, recently warned Prussia: "The union of Poland and Lithuania is a historic dogma of the Polish programme, and every step taken in Wilna against this principle will be felt by the whole Polish society as directed against itself. It is impossible to work a renewal of the Polish State and simultaneously treat the Lithuanians and Poles as crippled people. It is impossible to threaten Lithuania without arousing bitter feeling among the Poles."

IMPOSSIBLE TO MAKE PEACE WITH GERMANY

As the Democratic Ideals of Russian Parties Are Opposed to Imperialism.

Washington, Nov. 10.—Recalling that even the Bolsheviks themselves have declared for "a democratic peace," which is opposed to the German idea, it is believed to be hardly possible that on this basis Germany could entertain proposals from the Maximists for either a peace or an armistice.

It is pointed out, too, that even if the Germans did make a separate peace with the Maximists, the fact that this party represents a small section of the Russian people would make it necessary for the Central powers to continue to maintain a large military force on the border to guard against an offensive from the other element. Therefore, it is hoped that the military situation will not change materially for the worse for the Entente powers and America as a result of these latest developments. "If any considerable portion of the Russian army can be kept in the trenches, the advent of winter will operate to prevent the German troops who face them, from taking advantage of any temporary weakness to start an offensive."

WINNING DEMOCRACY WILL BRING PEACE

Germany's Regime Irreconcilable With Modern Spirit, Says Branting.

Amsterdam, Nov. 10.—Hjalmar Branting, Swedish Minister of Finance and Socialist leader, is quoted by a newspaper correspondent as saying: "Peace will come through the triumph of democracy. Germany's regime cannot be reconciled with the spirit of our times. Belgium will be completely reinstated and reparations made. Alsace-Lorraine must be restored to France." The Cologne Gazette's semi-official Berlin correspondent, commenting on this utterance, says: "We expect the Swedish Government to explain whether Branting's words can be reconciled with true neutrality."

PRIEST SENT TO PRISON.

Had Code Used for Sinn Fein Purposes.

Liverpool, Nov. 10.—Father Michael Daly, who has been for two years in the United States and who arrived here recently from New York, has been sentenced to three months' imprisonment for having in his possession a code by which the communications of naval and military information was possible. He was also charged with having two letters for conveyance into the United Kingdom, and with making a false declaration to an alien officer. Father Daly said the code had been given to him in the United States by a Father Murphy, who was interested in the Sinn Fein movement and who requested Father Daly to use it to send news concerning Ireland. It is said that Father Daly, after having acted as chaplain for a Virginia millionaire, was appointed assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in Alexandria, Va.

FORMER CORNWALL MAN

Co-Sergt-Major T. Jackson Awarded a D.C.M.

Cornwall, Nov. 10.—Among the Canadians decorated for the fighting around Hill 70 in August is Company Sergt-Major T. Jackson, a former resident of Cornwall, who was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal. Sergt-Major Jackson during his residence in Cornwall was in the employ of the Canada Mill in the finishing department. He enlisted with the original 21st Battalion at Cornwall and has seen continual service with this battalion since it crossed to France a little over two years ago.

WAR COMMITTEE NAMED IN ITALY

Gen. Diaz to Command Italian Armies—The Italian Rearguard Effectively Delaying the Teuton Advance.

ALLIES HAVE AWAKENED

TO NEED FOR CLOSER UNION ON WEST FRONTS.

Gen. Diaz to Command Italian Armies—The Italian Rearguard Effectively Delaying the Teuton Advance. Italian Army Headquarters, Nov. 10.—The conference of British, French and Italian representatives has returned in the creation of a permanent inter-allied military committee. New leadership for the Italian army has been provided. Gen. Cadorna, Italy, Gen. Foch, France, and Gen. Wilson, Britain, have been appointed to the committee. Among military officers the decision of the allies to create a permanent military committee has caused great satisfaction. It is accepted as evidence that the allies have awakened to the necessity for the closest union of the whole length of the western front for the political and military conduct of the war. Gen. Diaz, appointed to the command of the Italian armies, is one of Italy's ablest military leaders.

Delaying Teuton Advance.

Rome, Nov. 10.—The Italian rearguard is effectively and valiantly delaying the Teuton advance. By furious counter-attacks, General DiGiorgio's troops are protecting General Cadorna's retreat from the Tagliamento and Livorno rivers. A dozen bridges over the Livorno river have been blown up, and the fighting line now extends over a front of scarcely thirty miles.

War Tidings.

Russian naval and military delegates at all points on the Baltic coast have adhered to the new revolt. The British in Palestine have taken the coastal railroad at Beit Hanan, and the Turks are fleeing to Wadi Heus. The Italians continue to retreat in accordance with the plan of the general staff, but are pouring a rain of shells on the Austro-Germans. General Diaz has been appointed first in command of the Italian army, and General Badoglio second. One French and one British general will serve with the allied committee on the general staff.

WIRELESS IN TREES.

Owner Has Code Book With Shipping Messages. Norwich, Conn., Nov. 10.—A complete wireless receiving outfit has been recovered by federal agents near here, it became known yesterday, and has been confiscated by the Government. The owner and operator of the wireless outfit, Charles Troland, was not arrested. A code book found in his possession contained a number of messages concerning movements of ships sent out from Berlin, Germany, and also contained messages sent out by wireless from Sayville. The wireless was found concealed in trees 150 feet from the ground.

Fix Newspaper Price.

Washington, Nov. 10.—There was strong indication today that the print paper situation will soon be settled and a reasonable price fixed under Government control. The Federal Government of Australia has decided to postpone the meeting of Parliament and conduct the referendum on conscription under the existing powers. The voting day will probably be December 14th. The American gunboat Pales was fired upon by Chinese bandits on the Yang-tze-kiang, near Chungking, in the province of Szechuan. The gunboat was slightly damaged.

Germany Mobilizes Her Cartoonists

London, Nov. 10.—Germany is mobilizing her cartoonists and artists. In a long confidential circular to the editors of the papers of neutral countries, the Government says that the Allies have a "vulgar" habit of publishing bitter cartoons depicting "alleged" murders by German troops, etc. Germany has decided to counteract the certain influence of this campaign by supplying free to papers cartoons about German victories and depicting how the Kaiser's enemies have been felled.

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
