JUST TICKLED TO DEATH

OVER RESULT OF FIRST DAY OF CANVASS.

"A Good Start, a Strong Pull And a Strong Finish"—This is the Slogan of the Headquarters Staff.

The first big day of the Victory campaign is over. Would canvassers be smiling over the results. A quarter of a million is the result, and the men behind the project in Kingston are enthusiastic over the result.

"Mauv-happy" returns on your first success. With reporting from only half the districts the splendid spirit of the campaign is shown in the ten million subscribed. A good start, a strong pull, and then a strong finish, was the message received by G. R. Warburton, district officer, from the headquarters of the eastern division.

"Those last few words express my sentiments perfectly," said Mr. Warburton on Tuesday morning. "I'm tickled to death with the first-class showing of a quarter of a million dollars from this district in the first day, but the people must remember that we have seventeen days' hard work ahead. Unless we give consistent attention to the drive for that time we won't get the results. We don't want to get too enthused over the first day's work, but strive to reach and beat the million by steady, hard plugging. Mind you, I don't think Kingston can't do it. We are all very much pleased with the results, and only hope that we can all do our utmost to make this the banner district of the Dominion."

"Will you kindly make the Victory Loan a little clearer?" wrote a reader of the Whig. "You'd be wishing to buy \$400 or \$700 or \$800 have to buy four one hundred dollar bonds, etc., or would there be bonds issued for those amounts?" Kindly state this fact in a prominent place in your much read paper and oblige A Would Be Victory Loan Buyer.

The communication was shown to Mr. Warburton, who explained that bonds are issued in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and any authorized multiple of \$500. Since the printing of the prospectus the Minister of Finance has announced that bonds with denominations from \$50 up may be registered at Ottawa, thus ensuring absolute safety for the purchaser from fire, theft or other causes which might make a coupon bearing bond in the hands of the purchaser forfeited because of the inability to duplicate it.

Regarding the purchase of such a bond, Mr. Warburton took the \$300 bond as an example. This bond could be purchased in the following denominations: sixteen \$50 bonds, eight \$100 bonds, one \$500 bond and three \$100 bonds, or one \$500 bond and six \$50 bonds.

Meetings During the Day. During the day a number of meetings were held in various places around the city. The pupils and teachers of the Collegiate Institute were addressed by the Mayor and Robert Meek at 10 o'clock and the public school teachers in Macdonald school later in the afternoon. This is part of a plan to have the Victory Loan so simplified that it can be understood by pupils in the schools.

The employees of the Day's tannery were addressed on Tuesday morning, and the employees of the Canadian Locomotive Company on Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Warburton speaking at the latter place with the Mayor. A simplified plan of buying Victory Bonds specially proposed for the working man was explained. A duplicate card is handed to the employee, who can arrange to have a certain amount taken off his weekly wages to pay for the bond, making at the same time a gift edge investment.

The campaign is going to be pushed to the limit for the next three weeks, and if human ingenuity can bring success, Kingston is to be the great district of the Dominion. "Carry On," the motto of the soldiers, is to be the byword and watchword for the next three weeks. Be prepared to buy a bond even if it is only of a \$50 denomination. Remember the parable of the wise men.

Statement From R. Meek. When seen by the Whig on Tuesday morning, and asked for a statement regarding the first day's results of the Victory Loan campaign Robert Meek, chairman of the executive committee, said, "The results as measured by the subscriptions made up to last night were certainly greater than we expected."

"Some persons have mentioned to me that the audience in the City Hall last night was comparatively quiet and not inspired. My interpretation is that they were too deeply absorbed and had their whole mind on the subject. Even before the canvassers had begun their work this morning applications were coming in and showed that the addresses 'have done much to stimulate the interest in this pressing matter.'"
