DR. MACGILLIVRAY HONORED

BY THE CONGREGATION OF CHALMERS CHURCH

On the Occasion of His Retiring.—Presented With Annuity, also \$4,500, and Three Months' Salary—Gifts From the Choir.

The congregation of Chalmers Presbyterian Church did honor on Tuesday night to Rev. Dr. Malcolm Macgillivray, who has been its minister for the past thirty years, and who has just retired. Various gifts were presented to the venerable minister and his good wife, and many and earnest were the tributes paid to both of them.

There was a large gathering of Chalmers people in the church at eight o'clock. Prof. W. G. Jordan, moderator of the session, presided and conducted the opening exercises, assisted by Rev. J. Macalister.

Rev. Principal Gordon spoke on behalf of Queen's College, and told of the splendid service Dr. Macgillivray had rendered to Queen's and its students.

Rev. Douglas Laing spoke on behalf of the city congregations, and stated that he had been minister of the Baptist Church in Perth thirty-two years ago when Dr. Macgillivray was Presbyterian pastor in that town.

Dr. Macgillivray was looked up to and held in the greatest esteem by his brother clergymen. Rev. T. W. Savary bore testimony on behalf of the Kingston Ministerial Association to the good work Dr. Macgillivray had done in Kingston.

On behalf of the people of the congregation Rev. Principal Ross, senior member of the session, read an address to Dr. Macgillivray expressing the love of Chalmers people for him and their sorrow at the severing of the ministerial tie. Principal Ross said he first met Dr. Macgillivray forty-two years ago when he was applying for license as a minister of the gospel.

Twelve years later he had recommended him to Chalmers as a preacher peculiarly fitted to that congregation, and his induction followed. W. H. Macnee, for the Board of Managers, then presented Dr. Macgillivray with an annuity of \$600, to-

gether with three months' salary, and stated that \$4,500 additional would be invested to bring the highest rate of interest possible.

D. Couper and Mrs. J. R. C. Dobbs, on behalf of the choir, presented the doctor with an electric lamp and candles. On behalf of the ladies of the congregation, Mrs. S. W. Dyde, the oldest member, presented Mrs. Macgillivray with a beautiful bouquet of roses. Mrs. Macgillivray, in responding, said that she had always thought of Chalmers as the dearest congregation in the world, and she would always continue to think so.

James M. Farrell read a telegram he had received during the day from a man prominent in the financial world who lives "down by the sea," and who wished to be considered as one of the congregation on this auspicious occasion. Mr. Farrell said the party in question had never worshipped in Chalmers, but he still considered Dr. Macgillivray as his pastor, for he had when a young man exerted a great influence for good upon him. The message spoke of the retiring minister as one who was the personification of goodness.

Dr. Macgillivray was overwhelmed when he ascended to the pulpit which he had occupied for twenty-seven years, and he had retired because he had no visible physical ailment—it had provided for him, so that he could look into the future with encouragement. His student days and his ministry had exactly covered the period of Confederation—fifty years—when he was one of the first to be ordained by the United Presbyterian Church in Canada on the 31st of October, 1875. He reviewed his ministry briefly, and touched upon the development of scientific and theological thought during the past half a century. He would continue to reside in Kingston and worship in Chalmers, and he hoped the congregation would soon find a successor who would meet with great success in ministering to them.

The singing of the hymn, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past," and the pronouncing of the benediction by Principal Gordon, closed the service, and then the gathering adjourned into the Sunday school hall, where refreshments were served by the ladies.

CAUSING ANXIETY

Scarcity of Cars For Munitions Makes It Impossible to Ship Canadian Hay to U. S.

There seems no hope of any immediate or even distant improvement of the hay situation for Canadian farmers and it is freely predicted that hay will strike a record low price this year.

At Cape Vincent, N.Y., there are now 600 cars of hay which cannot be moved because of the United States Government's act in commandeering cars for munition transportation. The railroads have also placed an embargo on the shipment of Canadian hay.

For this reason the farmers in this district will not be able to offer their hay to the American market, and thus in competition receive a higher price for this product.
