SUM OF \$2,595 RAISED

SCHOOL CHILDREN OF KINGS-TON HAVE DONE MAGNIFICENTLY

The Teachers Are Urging a Patriotic Effort, and a Big Sum for Red Cross Has Been Subscribed.

This is a time when every person, not excluding the little tots at the schools, are doing everything possible to help the Dominion in this national crisis. By the constant work of the teachers, to whom great credit is due for putting the matter to the pupils in its proper light, the magnificent sum of \$2,595.68 has been raised by the school children of this city for the Red Cross Societies since the war began.

John McDonald, secretary of the Board of Education, has made the announcement of the following figures showing, exactly what each school has done and when consideration is made of the number of rooms in each case a comparison can be made:

JAMES HALLIDAY TO RUN

Against Dr. J. W. Edwards in the Frontenac Riding.



JAMES HALLIDAY. James A. Halliday, Portsmouth, one of the best known men in the city and county, and an ex-warden of Frontenac, Ont., reported Dr. J. W. Edwards for the Ottawa house in the elections, on December 17th.

This announcement was made, late on Thursday afternoon at a well attended and very enthusiastic meeting of the Frontenac Liberals held in the Liberal rooms.

Robert H. Fair, county road overseer, made the nomination and James Baxter seconded it. When put to a vote the meeting unanimously and amid loud applause voiced its confidence in Mr. Halliday. Speeches were made by prominent Liberals present, including J. Jamieson, president of the County Liberal Association, Dr. A. W. Richardson, president of the city Liberal Association, and Lieut-Col. F. S. Ferguson, who recently returned from overseas.

Mr. Halliday in an interview stated that he was running as an independent Win-the-War Liberal candidate.

QUEEN'S CASUALTIES.

Large Number of Undergraduates Reported in Recent Lists.

In the casualty lists of the last few days the names of a number of Queen's University undergraduates, who have borne their share of the fighting, are announced.

Charles McKillop Reid, son of Robert Reid, Ferguson, Ont., reported killed in action, entered Arts in 1907, and commenced his combined Arts and Science course in 1911.

At the time of enlistment he was teaching in Vegreville, Alta., and was granted a commission in the 4th Battalion.

Lieut. William Dobson, who as "Dobbie" was well known in Queen's hockey circles, has been severely wounded in the knee, according to information received at the University.

Lieut. Dobson was with the 4th C. M. R. and was a graduate in Arts and Theology of the university.

Lieut. "Joe" O'Neill, for one session B. S. M. of Queen's University, C. O. T. C., has been reported wounded.

Lieut. O'Neill's home is in Lindsay, and he is a graduate of Arts.

Lieut. A. B. C. Throop, Arts '17, Peterborough, is reported gassed. He secured his commission in the artillery in April, 1916, from Queen's Hospital Corps.
