Get Good Boxing Course. Soldiers at Fort Sheridan are get-

ting a pretty thorough course in boxng under the supervision of Martin A. Delaney, a Chicago physical direc-tor. Classes are held every day, and every one of the 4,000 men in camp

This means that about 2,000 bouts are pulled off at Fort Sheridan every day. Camp officials assert boxing teaches the men the alertness and aggressiveness needed for success in bayonet fighting.
