### FIGHT GERMAN BOYS IN 1918

The Enemy is Rapidly Overdrawing the Reserve of Man-Power.

### VERY BIG LOSS THIS YEAR

SUSTAINED BY THE GERMANS ON WEST FRONT.

Great Difficulty is Experienced by the Foo in Keeping Divisions Up to the Strength.

British Headquarters in France, Nov. 17.—The German losses in 1917 in the 300 odd divisions which have been hammered on the western front by the British and French together must amount to over one million, which figure does not include the losses among other than those of infantry divisions. The rapidity with which Germany has been calling out the younger classes is shown in the following facts: At the beginning of the war the 1914 class was called out the 1st September of that year. ## THE ACTIVITIES OF WOMEN

Wedding rings were first worn by Egyptian wives.

Women retain their vitality and spirits longer than men do.

Seattle, Wash., has a housemaids' union with over 2,000 members.

Princess Mary of England is planting her own vegetable garden.

United States women have already given \$36,400,000 for Red Cross work.

Mrs. George Q. Horwitz, mayor of Moore Haven, Fla., is not a suffragist.

There are over 10,000 unorganized women and girl workers in Seattle, Washington.

Wages of women bookbinders in Philadelphia have been increased 20 per cent.

Women are employed to sort scrap iron in the Sacramento shops of the Southern Pacific railroad.

Out of every 1,000 wage earners employed in the industries of New Jersey, 274 are women.

Mrs. Martha J. Suitt, of Durham, N.C., who is now past 90 years of age, has 112 descendants.

More women are employed in government positions in England than in any other place in the world.

Miss Bessie Lipsitz is official cow tester of the Avoca Cow Testing Association of Wisconsin.

Women doing men's work are now admitted to full membership in the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen.

The Women's Education and Industrial Union of Boston is teaching women the proper way to make surgic dressings.

Women are entering practically every industry in the United States, and what is more, they are making good everywhere.

Ruth Law, who is working at a United States aviation recruiting station, claims to have enlisted over 1,500 recruits already.

Mrs. Samuel Haight, a former Minnesotan, is the first woman to hold a seat in the provincial legislature of Saskatchewan.

Miss Eva Thacker is known as the champion farerette in England, having recently defeated 340 other women in a competition test.

The former Dowager Empress Marie, mother of the deposed Czar of Russia, is now engaged in tilling the soil on her farm near Yalta.

In the automobile industry women are beginning to do much of the lighter work and in many places have replaced men as chauffeurs.

Between April, 1914, and April, 1917, there has been an increase of 44,500 in the number of women who have taken up agriculture in England.

Mrs. William G. McAdoo, wife of the United States secretary of the treasury, plans to enlist every woman in America in the second Liberty Loan campaign.

Mrs. Robert Lansing, wife of the United States secretary of state, has accepted the secretaryship of the National Association Opposed to Woman Suffrage.

So prevalent has become the cigarette smoking habit among young girls in England that a movement has been started to curb the habit by legislation.

Owing to the shortage of male help thirty women have started work as lumber pilers and machine tenders in a large woodworking plant in Spokane, Wash.

Congressman Jeanette Rankin has introduced a resolution in the United States Congress which authorizes the President to take over and operate all the metal mines in the United States.

Queen Victoria of Sweden is a daughter of the late Grand Duke of Baden, granddaughter of the late emperor of Germany, and full cousin of the present emperor.

For the sixteenth successive year Mrs. Ella Walker has again been elected president of the Berwick, Pa., Widows' Association, the only organization of its kind in the United States.

A free aviation school for women desiring to help Uncle Sam win the war has been opened in St. Louis by Captain John Perry, the balloonist. Already over 500 women have been enrolled.

Mrs. Laura Starcher, mayor of Umatilla, Ore., the first city in the country to have a municipal administration composed entirely of women, has resigned and Mrs. Helen T. Duncan appointed in her place.

The English training school for women welders, which was started in 1915 by the Women's Service Bureau, has gone on and prospered until now it is admitted to be the best school of its kind in Great Britain.

Great Britain has over 950 women editors, authors and journalists, and of these five have an income of \$20,000 a year. In the United States there are over 12,000 women engaged in literary work as apart from journalistic work.

Twenty women clad in overalls and jumpers have been put to work in the St. Joseph, Mo., shops of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad, where they are engaged in wiping locomotives and acting as mechanics' helpers.

Thirty-seven out of 42 women who took the physical examination for positions on the sanitary police force in Cleveland were found in perfect physical condition. Only 22 men out of a total of 72 were successful in passing the same examination.

English women in France are employed in many kinds of work which are clerks, librarians, accountants, typists, cooks, wine waitresses, butlers, domestic work, motor transport service, tailors, shoemakers, bakers and linen men in the telegraph and telephone service.

Switches in the telegraph and telephone service are practically no social engagements. Queen Mary of England works harder now than in the days before the war. Her day begins with breakfast at 9, then comes letters at 9.30, all of which are carefully considered and answers suggested or dictated. She is so methodical in her work that frequently she gets through an immense amount of routine work by the lunch hour at 1.30.
