A MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

HAS BEEN STARTED BY THE KINGSTON Y.M.C.A.

It is Hoped to Add 200 Boys and 100 Men to the Present Membership Lists.

"A splendid start" is the way R. H. Ward, membership chairman described the affair in connection with the launching of Y.M.C.A. annual membership campaign Monday night at the association rooms. After about sixty workers had partaken of a tempting supper served by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the "Y," Mr. Ward called the meeting to order. He explained the conditions of the campaign for members, which will be in the form of a huge automobile race with fourteen teams participating. The speaker told the boys that they were asked to secure 300 men and boys to fill in the gaps in the membership rolls this year.

General secretary F. J. Wilson also spoke briefly telling the workers that it was up to them to make a continuation of the Y.M.C.A. work possible both for the soldiers and the citizens.

It was pointed out to the team workers that the work of the Association, both locally and abroad, especially in its relation to the soldier, should commend itself to every fair-minded citizen and the boys should have no hesitation in asking any business man or man exempt from military service to pay the small membership fee to assist keeping the work strong.

The campaign will last one week, closing on Monday, November 26th, at 9.30 p.m., when it is hoped that at least 200 boys and 100 men will have been enrolled as members during the canvass.

The Sunday school room in Queen Street Methodist church was crowded on Monday evening when several hundred people sat down to the anniversary supper under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid Society.

Capt. R. Crawford and G. A. Bate-man extended a vote of thanks to those who had aided in the success of the evening.

ALL STUDENTS MUST REPORT

Senate of Queen's University Keeps "Tab" on Students.

The senate of Queen's University has issued a notice insisting that all students in the university either present their service receipts or exemption claims under the Military Service Act, or explain why they have not fulfilled the regulations of the act. Men under twenty years of age, those over thirty-four years of age or married men, or men of American or foreign parentage must state this fact in a letter to the Senate before November 26th. This is part of a plan to keep "tab" on all students lest they be not acquainted with the provisions of the Act, and anyone not complying with the request will not be allowed to attend lectures after December 1st.

LEUT. MALLOCH HOME

Arnprior Officer Who Trained at Kingston Has Arrived

Lieut. Edward Malloch, Arnprior, has arrived at his home from France after serving for many months overseas. Lieut. Malloch at the beginning of the war was granted a commission in the guard which looked after internment operations at Petawawa camp. Later he was transferred to the 5th Battalion and trained at Banfffield camp in the summer of 1915. He went overseas with a draft from that battalion, and after several months' stay in England was transferred sent to the 20th Battalion in France with which he served until quite recently.

The Crown Failed.

In the Toronto Police Court, on Monday, the crown failed to show that the proprietors of the Arnprior hotel had any knowledge of improper uses to which it is alleged, their premises were being put. T. C. Robinette, who appeared for the defence, satisfied the Magistrate that his clients had no "guilty knowledge."
