
Nothing is smarter than the frocks in princess line and this model combines simplicity and chic. It is developed in blue gabardine.

In the new princess effect is this delightful frock of dark blue gabardine, which closes at the left shoul der and along the jeft side-front under a box-plait. The box plaits, by the way, are applied, so that one or two may be omitted, if desired. A large collar finishes the open neck, or it may be collarless. In medium size the model requires 514 yards 54-inch

The simple directions for making. supplemented by the construction guide, require that a dart be taken up in the right front at shoulder, as the first step. Bring shoulder toge ther and stitch along corresponding small "o" perforations. Next, close under-arm and shoulder seams as notched. Join right and left fronts matching triple notches, from single To finish the neck, face the collar large "O' perforation in right front and sew to neck edge as notched, to lower edge and finish edges above perforation for closing Large "O" free forward of left shoulder seam perforations in right front indicate and finish for closing.

plait over the seam joining fronts and along the edge of right from above seam. Leave plaits free be tween small "o" perforations to slip belt through. Large "O" perforations indicate back edge of back plait and front edge of the side-front plait.

To make the belt and sash, first gather the ends of the belt between perforations. Form plaits at straight end of sash and in center placing "T" on corresponding small perforations and tack. Foll plaited end under to the plait at center and tack forming a loop. Ship the sash over one end of belt with loop on outside and tack to position Slip ball through openings under box-plaits, or arrange around waist over plaits and close at left side

To finish the neck, face the collar center-backs even. Leave the collar

MAKING CANDLES.

How Our Grandmothers Furnished the Tallow Dips.

In these days when kerosene, gas, and electricity take so large a place in the lighting of the world, there is danger that the tallow dips of our grandmothers may be forgotten. Candlemaking was the great housekeeping event of the fall of the year. The light and cheer of the long winter evenings in every home of Canada depended upon the candles which the frugal housewives made and stored away in boxes for the use of the family.

What a day it was for the children when the great brass kettle was brought out and hung upon the crane in the huge fireplace, where the great logs were crackling and the blaze was ascending through a chimney as large as some modern rooms. Before the dawn of the day, the whole family were astir, writes Mary B. Claffin. The great fire was lighted, the frugal breakfast was eaten, and the children were all excitement.

The kettle was first partly filled with water, and, when this was hot, cakes of tallow were broken up and thrown into the water to melt and float upon the top. How to Test Diamonds.

The public is frequently deceived n regard to the sale of jewelry and precious stones, and the authorities have issued a statement upon the accurate testing of diamonds.

When a diamond is quite clean and dry, the following experiment should be tried: Place on the surface a tiny drop of water and then take a needle or pin and try to move the drop about. If the diamond is genuine the drop can be rolled about intact. On the other hand, where the gem is an imitation the water spreads directly it is touched with the needle-

Another very good test may be varied out with a tumbler of water. Into this put the suspected article and examine its appearance. A real diamond will show up in the water with a startling clearness, and it can never be confounded with the water. On the other hand, the imitation looks indefinite and it is sometimes difficult to see it at all,-London
