CITY MUST PAY IN FULL INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

FOR THE LIGHTING OF THE STREETS THIS YEAR.

The Utilities Commission Will Not Accept the Amount in the Budget Owing to the Higher Cost of Production.

The Fire and Light Committee finds that the Utilities Commission is not going to accept the sum of \$16,000 in full for street lighting this year. That amount was all that the City Council provided in the budget, and if Hydro-Electric power had arrived in Kingston early in the season and saved some of the Utilities Commission's cost, perhaps the \$16,000 would have covered the lighting bill. But Hydro power from the Trent will not be here for another week at least, so that the year has practically gone without any benefit being got from it. The Utilities Commission, owing to the high prices of coal and oil, faces deficits in both electrical and gas departments, and it is not to be wondered at that it wants the city to pay in full for street lighting and is not agreeable to take the \$16,000 provided in the civic budget as was done last year.

The October bill was before the committee yesterday afternoon. It amounts to \$1,770.31, and the committee hasn't a dollar to meet it. The September lighting bill overdrove the street lighting appropriation by \$35, so the civic financing committee will have to provide the money for the final quarter of the year. That means an overdraft of over \$5,000 for next year's Council to carry.

Ald. Polson, chairman of the committee, stated that next year the city might have to pay a higher rate for street lighting. At present the ordinary arc lamps cost the city \$60 each and the "white way" lamps \$75. Unless the advent of Hydro power makes a difference, the city may be taxed twenty-five per cent. more. It seems that the tendency in other places is to charge for street lighting so that the commissions may be able to offer power to manufacturing concerns at the lowest possible rates.

It was decided to notify the Utilities Commission that a number of arc lamps are reported to be continually going out, and that they should be given attention.

Chief Armstrong, who had his foot badly injured in the Boyd garage fire some weeks ago, was able to be present at the meeting.
