ONE IN EVERY EIGHT SUBSCRIBES IN THIS COUNTY.

Two More Days Are Left to Make the Objective—Toronto Headquarters Sends Congratulations.

"With two days to go, Ontario must pile up a total of fifty millions to get over the 200 millions hurdle. This is a task worthy of Ontario's sons. Your old country has done nobly to date but from now on until midnight Saturday every man must lift every ounce that's in him and all previous records in the grand old province will be smashed to atoms."

This was the telegram received on Friday morning from Norman Sommerville, chief organizer of the Victory Loan. Mr. Warburton in discussing it said: "The people must remember that there are only two days left. With a record of \$92,000 for yesterday and such places as Howe Island giving \$21,000, the situation is plain." Then Mr. Warburton added: "One person in every eight in this county has taken some of the loan."

The total up to last night was \$1,826,600. Robert Meek, chairman of the Victory Loan executive, received the following from G. P. Wood, chairman of the provincial committee, Toronto:

"The Provincial Executive join hands with your executive and workers after two and a half weeks' strenuous but glorious work. The results are simply wonderful. All credit to you and your men who have produced them. But the previous days must be as nothing to the next two days. Fifty millions in two days, is our slogan in order to pass the two hundred million mark for Ontario alone."

Senator Richardson's Investment.

G. R. Warburton, organizer of the Victory Loan campaign said to the Whig this afternoon that he has just been advised that the James Richardson Co., Ltd., had just signed up for bonds to the value of \$255,000. "This amount," said Mr. Warburton, "puts Richardson's investments over the \$2,000,000 figure. But we are not going to stop there. We will go strong until Saturday night and we will have a big pot before the campaign ends."

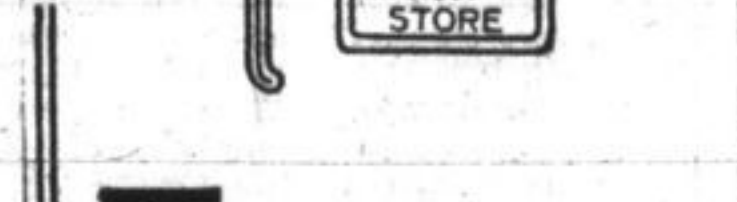

HUNS MADE POOR CLOTH

Everything They Made was a Cheap, Shoddy Imitation.

David Will of the Semi-ready Store, 213 Princess street, says:

"Imports of made-in-Germany goods started price corruption in Canada over twenty years ago. The Germans made shoddy imitations of sterling English goods and found ready sale for their deceptive wares. German makers of men's clothes came to Canada, and everybody in the trade was stampeded into seeing how cheap and hasty they could manufacture. Ready-made clothing became a questionable business."

"In 1895, just 22 years ago, the Semi-ready Company was founded by Canadians from Toronto, Montreal and Peterboro, and the purpose was to see how good they could make men's clothes. They put actual hand tailoring and custom made methods into each garment, but bought and sold in a wholesale way. They organized tailor shops and developed skilled specialists. They did this all at a cost of about a dollar more on each suit."

"Most men willingly pay a little more to get a lot more. Before the war the false German idea in tailoring men's clothes had been about vanquished. May it never again become the vogue in Canada to sacrifice quality for a cheap dollar!" concluded Mr. Will.
