The latest mail from abroad would indicate that some of the veterans of the First Canadian Contingent are now on the Italian front.

Pres. S. Lavisky, John McCormick and F. T. Walker are reported killed in action. All enlisted at Kingston, but had residences elsewhere.

Col. W. D. Gordon, formerly of Kingston, is gazetted general staff officer with the Imperials. He has been doing special service in England since the war broke out.

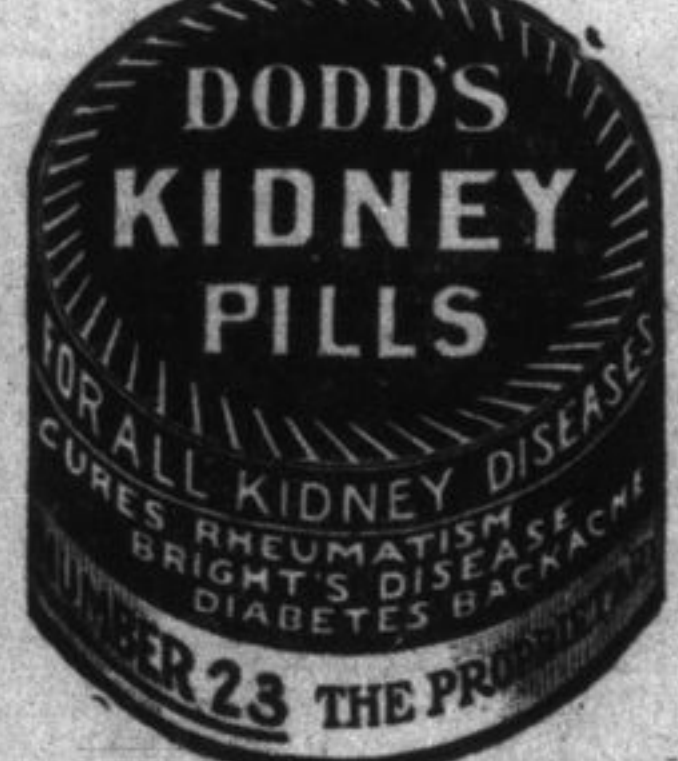
A substantial part of the proceeds are to be devoted to war relief work and it is hoped that as a result of the performance some help may be given to those who have suffered in the devastated war areas.

### THE PRESS MUST REMAIN FREE.

His Grace the Archbishop of Kingston took occasion in his address in St. Mary's Cathedral on Friday to refer to the attitude of the Kingston press in regard to the Sister Basil trial.

The Whig believes that the differences which have arisen in the Roman Catholic Church as a result of this trial should be settled by the members of that church. We tender no advice. Neither did we tender any advice or comment before or during the process of the trial.

The trial was a public matter, tried publicly, and as such was entitled to the publicity the daily newspapers gave it.

But the Whig resents, very vigorously and very forcibly, the threat of the Archbishop to proscribe the Whig. We beg to remind His Grace that we are living in the 20th Century and that remarks such as he made to-day can have no effect on what will be published in our columns.

The press in Ontario cannot be silenced whatever may be the case elsewhere. The publication of news is essential to the well-being of the people and to the intellectual advancement of the State. The threat held out by His Grace is unwarranted and unnecessary. This is still a free country and the press cannot be muzzled.

### A SECTION FOREMAN MEETS DEATH ON TRACK

**James Hunter Was Struck by G.T.R. Engine Near Collins Bay.**

James Hunter, about sixty-two years of age, employed as a section foreman by the Grand Trunk Railway, was run down by an engine two miles east of Collins Bay, on Friday morning between 9.45 and 10 o'clock and instantly killed.

Deceased lived at Cataract, and is survived by his wife and a grown up family. He had been employed by the company for upwards of forty years.

The engine that figured in the accident was running light to Belleville.

The remains were brought to Kingston and taken to S. S. Corbett's undertaking parlors, and Coroner Dr. D. E. Mundell was notified.
