IMPROVEMENTS ARE MADE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

IN GENERAL HOSPITAL WARD AND LIGHTING SYSTEM.

To Make Christmas Appeal to the People for Money and a Generous Response is Expected.

The Board of Governors of Kingston General Hospital on Monday afternoon discussed matters of present interest to the hospital. The report of the medical superintendent showed that a large number of patients had been admitted and discharged during the month, and that November had been a busy time in the hospital.

The report of the managing committee mentioned that all the wards and bath rooms connected therewith were being thoroughly gone over and renovated and that a better lighting system was being installed, and the chairman stated that the general improvement was very noticeable.

No report was received from the visiting governors, and the names of R. F. Elliott and James Crawford were entered as visitors for December.

It was decided to make the usual Christmas appeal through the press and mails. Feeling that the good work being done in the hospital is now so generally recognized, it is only reasonable to expect that the response will be even more generous than usual.

BAGOT STREET DUMP IS MUCH IMPROVED

Carters and Other Drivers to be Warned Not to Bring Combustibles.

A Whig representative paid a visit on Tuesday morning to the Bagot street dump, which has been the subject of much criticism in City Council and out during the past few months. He found conditions greatly improved. The only odor that came his way was from refuse from the gas plant, which had been deposited there. Smoke was coming from a few spots on top, but this should be overcome. There is a warning on the gate posts to carters with regard to combustible material being prohibited. Ald. Newman is going to have circulars printed and served on all carters and merchants' drivers pointing out that they must not take anything in the line of papers or other combustible materials to the dump. Combustibles must be separated and taken to the incinerator. There is a penalty for violating this regulation. The filling in of this old swamp will be a great benefit to Cataract ward and the whole city. Almost useless ground is being reclaimed and a mosquito breeding place will gradually be abolished. If care is exercised by the caretaker in refusing to allow any combustible materials on the dump there should be no little ground for further complaint, some of the residents down there say.
