Letters to the Editor

"A Gas Attack!" Kingston, Dec. 1.—(To the Editor): In your issue of Nov. 20th you stated editorially (1) that Dr. Richardson was brought forward in opposition to the Union Government, and (2) that he did not resolutely or irresolutely commit himself (a) to the enforcement of conscription, and (b) to the support of the Union Government.

I was "brought out" and stand as a Liberal, representing the Liberal party, holding our liberty sacred and believing that the people not only rule, but are the Government, and that no Government can rule without the consent of the people. I believe in Union but only after the people have said who shall dominate the Union. Liberals have more than once been told by Mr. Borden and his followers that they were disloyal, that the Borden Government could and would do without their help. After 2 1/2 years of mismanagement, party profiteering and unexampled corruption, Mr. Borden found himself discredited and his Cabinet falling to pieces. He then stated certain conditions, without which, he said, no Union was possible, conditions which he knew were not acceptable to the Liberal party; he proposed Union on this impossible basis, and now blames Liberals for not accepting.

Union Government is the weakest of all Governments. This Union Government is not Union; it is a conglomerate; it is not granite, it is mass, and no sincere man believes it can last six months. In fact, I have been urged by some Liberals to support the Borden union, being assured that in six months Liberals will rule the House. My reply was: "Why waste six months? Why not let the people say who they wish to represent them?" I believe, the Borden Union is in the nature of a gas attack on the public, a smoke screen, to hide the corruption and party profiteering of the old Borden Cabinet. There can be no forgiveness without repentance and restitution. The Liberals who have joined Mr. Borden, with his admitted inability to handle great questions and solve intricate national problems, wisely know why they have done so. Personally I can have no fellowship with men who for the sake of their country's agony, and who, while crying "Union," set race against race, creed against creed and inflame the worst passions of the heart. How can we stand united if brother fights brother and neighbors quarrel while the enemy is at the door? During the last week of the contest the Government has arranged for a gigantic advertising campaign on race lines. Huge sums of money have been furnished, and the McKim Advertising Agency, of Montreal, is handling it. These advertisements are all paid for at so much per line from the election fund. Do not be deceived by them.

As to Canada's part in the war, Germany must be destroyed. Hence I have no patience and at present would not waste time arguing with the Tory-Nationalist of Quebec whom the Borden-Ames-Bourassa band in 1911 guaranteed would never be asked for a man's dollar in England's wars overseas as a price for their support. I have nothing but admiration for the Liberals from French-Canadian Quebec and elsewhere in Canada, who, emulating Papineau and Girouard, bore the slurs and lying assertions of Tory politicians, gave the lie to their traducers, went to Ypres, St. Julian, Zillebeke, the Somme and Vimy Ridge and are still fighting or resting under the shell-shattered soil, while flowers in their graves with fragrance and the birds chant their requiem.

which was designed to raise the number of our troops to 500,000. I shall never cast a vote to repeal it or impede its enforcement. I couldn't support Borden in the manner of its enforcement. I can be no planner. The workings of the Military Service Act are manifestly unfair to Canada as a whole. It is, however, only in keeping with what has been Sir Robert Borden's fixed policy, since the outbreak of the war. It is my opinion that at no time was Sir Robert sincere in desiring to get a large number of recruits from the Province of Quebec.

The whole purpose of his propaganda would have been destroyed had he successfully recruited in Quebec—destroyed because the weapon of race and religion cry which he has so assiduously worked with would have become a useless thing. Mr. Borden's whole policy has been along lines to blacken Quebec in the eyes of English-speaking Canada. The action of local tribunals in Quebec appear to bear out my conviction that again in the present crisis Borden has, one might almost say, taken steps to see that Quebec was exempted. This enables him to keep the race cry alive. At the same time, however, Borden was willing to blind English Canada white of its man power. He will save Quebec, rob the man power of this city, and Mr. Nickle asks you to help him do it! It is the basest kind of trickery, but the public is at last aroused to Mr. Borden's plans to gain power at any cost or by any method.

He pleads haste, and though seven months have passed no troops raised by conscription have yet been called out. Nine weeks wasted on the C.N.R. bill and three on the disgraceful War Time Elections Act.

On the score of his method of Application both of the voluntary recruiting system and the Military Service Act I do not consider he is entitled to the support of the electorate. Borden says 100,000 more men. Newburn goes him five times over and says 500,000 more men. Rayville, the Deputy Speaker, writes Quebec: "I have gained my point. Quebec will not be affected by Conscription!" Borden whispers to Quebec: "Keep this to yourself," but in Ontario, "It'll make these conscripts in the ranks of the Canada protest. Mr. Borden says all farmers will be exempt. H. M. Mow says they are after the "20,000 counter-hoppers in Toronto. Mewburn says any one who is wrongfully conscripted will personally disfigure." That sounds like Prussian absolutism and German militarism! Does Borden really know what he intends doing? He has clearly demonstrated that his vacillatory attitude towards the issue of conscription would be marked by the same insincerity under the new Borden Union as under the old Borden-Bourassa-Nationalist Cabinet.

The Liberals state clearly: Obedience to the Conscription Act, redeem Canada's honor, the foolish Borden pledges, but when that is done ask Canada if, after giving 7 1/2 per cent of our population to military service, how much farther she can go with safety. President Wilson is a Peace President and therefore the greatest war director. We can trust Laurier in this crisis to raise the 100,000, so the country's industries will not be crippled nor its transportation interfered with. The present application of the exemption boards is ruinous to Canada for Judge Winchester states that at the present rate of exemption the married men might be called in February, though this has been denied. Is this your desire or is it good for Canada? If Quebec is exempted, as Mr. Rainville pledges the Borden government, then to keep Borden's pledges the married men must go in two months. I cannot support a Union led by Mr. Borden with Meighan, Crothers, Reid, Blondin and Serigny. The sins of Borden Foster, Serigny and Blondin as well as Flavelle and Allison can not be paid for by Victory loans or Hanna's order to "Eat less." These debts can not be liquidated by Fielding's financial skill, Meighan's legal casuistry or pettyfogging legal phraseology; Crother's mastery, inactivity, Garfield's cruel surgery or Rowell's fountain of waters of life! If the elections are satisfied with what they have seen of party favoritism in military affairs, the holding of positions at big pay by men who should be overseas, but boast how they escaped serving, the treatment of returned men and soldiers' families, let them vote for Borden. If the working men, clerks and merchants are satisfied with the high cost of living, let them vote for Borden and he will put it higher. Ask the labor unions how they were treated by Mr. Nickle at the Causeway to Barriefield. If the Borden Union Government is returned to power, Flavelle, Allison, Blondin, Flavelle will still be favorites, whose methods differ but results are identical, viz.—an impoverished people and an enriched aristocracy.

How many working men made 50 per cent profits on their investment of blood or brain? How many of our disabled heroes later on a pension of \$5 a month, with milk at 12c per quart and bacon 57c per pound, while war profiteers buy Victory Bonds in million dollar lots and swell local lists in quarter-million dollar churches?
