

#### OVERSEAS INCIDENTS OF THE

FORCE BEGINNING OF YEAR.

Parcels Must Bear "Coupon" Issued by the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, Eng.-One Hundred Pounds Every Four Weeks. The Post Office Department has ssued regulations regarding the sending of parcels overseas to prisoners of war, which will go into force on January 1st. 1918.

It is advis- kets. able that application should be made to the prisoners of war department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, Eng., for the necessary coupons for parcels packed per sonally at the earliest possible mo-These coupons are to be used for foodstuffs only, and no coupons can be used for amounts under ten pounds. If therefore, it is desired to despatch a parcel weighing less than ten pounds, an ordinary coupon must be used and the parcel counts as one of the four permissable in

Parcels for officers interned in Bulgaria and Turkey come under the new scheme. Owing, however, to the difficulties of postal com munication, it is not advisable to send many parcels to officers Turkish camps. Supplies can purchased in Asia Minor, and it is better to remit money to prisoners rather than send many parcels.

This new scheme relates only to parcels containing foodstuffs, and does not affect in any way the present regulations governing the transmission of parcels to prisoners of war other than officers which regulations remain unchanged
