Military News

The Kingston infantry draft commanded by Lieut. L. I. Johnson has arrived in England.

Capt. (Rev.) T. Dodds, of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Sonya has been for some time attached to a stationary hospital in France. Mrs. (Capt.) Dodds, who for the second time has been honored by the British Red Cross, has resigned her work owing to indifferent health. Both are well known in Kingston.

Lieut. J. Herbert Higginson was killed in action "somewhere in France" on Nov. 30th. Lieut. Higginson was a member of the Royal Horse Artillery, and had been in action not quite a year. At sixteen he entered the Royal Military College, where he tried to enlist for overseas service, but on account of his youth was turned down. Lieut. Higginson made a second attempt, and took another year's course and thence proceeded overseas. He was in his nineteenth year. He was the only son of J. F. Higginson, Buckingham, Que.

A. W. Sirett, district agricultural representative, is acting on behalf of the farmers who claim exemption from military service because of the need for farm help. He is acting under instructions from the Agricultural Department.

Lieut. G. E. Wood is attached to the Depot Battalion on instructional duty.

J. T. Richardson is receiving a great number of applications from farmers for their exemption from military service.

A draft of fifty men from the R. C.H.A., and of 400 from the Ottawa Signalling Training Depot has been authorized to leave shortly for overseas.

The work of having the ballot bags for military voting made ready and filled with the necessary books, papers, bible, etc., has been completed by Lieut.-Col. G. H. Gillespie and Sergt. D. J. Evans.

Lieut. O. C. Lawrence, C.A.V.C., has been authorized to proceed overseas at an early date.

Lieut. F. H. Purdy has been taken on the strength of the C.E.F. in Canada.

Lieut. A. Aylea has been appointed as a lieutenant in No. 3 Special Service Company.

Lieut. W. E. Logue has been struck off the strength of the C.E.F.

Major J. Glass and Lieut. E. A. Green have been transferred to the C.E.F., Reserve of Officers.

Capt. J. H. Box, M.C., and S. Cronk, who have been holding medical boards at Pembroke and Mat-tawa, have returned to the city.

No officer, N.C.O. or man of the Canadian Military Forces, who has been granted leave of absence with permission to proceed to the United States of America in uniform, shall drink any intoxicating liquor in any hotel, restaurant, bar, or other public place in the United States while in uniform. Any reported breach of this order will be severely dealt with.—District orders.
