## ON RELIGIOUS EDUCATION INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

### KINGSTON PRESBYTERY HELD INSTRUCTIVE CONFERENCE.

Three Calls to Ministers Were Dealt With at Meeting on Tuesday Afternoon — Report on Augmented Charges.

At the Tuesday afternoon session of the Kingston Presbytery, the following elders were appointed to seats in the Presbytery and Synod, to equalize the representation of ministers and elders:

Prof. W. T. McClement, Prof. J. Mathewson, D. A. Shaw, J. C. Young, Trenton, R. J. Diack, J. M. Strange, W. T. Minnes, J. C. Linklater, Gananoque; J. W. Cook, Belleville; John Lee, Levan; B. Mallory, Belleville; Samuel Stewart-Hillier; William Kemp, Wolfe Island; Benjamin Heribson, Lansdowne.

Rev. Mr. Omand's resignation from Picton was accepted and Mr. Foster, of Trenton, was appointed as moderator of session, to declare the pulpit vacant and to moderate in a call when the congregation is prepared.

The Presbytery held an instructive conference on religious education, led by Rev. E. R. McLean of Cooke's Church, as representative of the Assembly's committee on Young People's Societies and Sunday schools, and thanks were tendered to Rev. Mr. McLean and Rev. Mr. Kidd for their able presentation of the subject.

A call from John Street Church, Belleville, in favor of Rev. D. C. Ramsay was sustained, and arrangements were made for his induction into this charge on Jan. 4th next.

A call from Dalhousie in favor of Rev. A. H. Gardiner, being declined, was set aside, and Rev. Dr. Wallace was authorized to moderate again when the congregation is prepared.

The auditors reported the books of the treasurer, Rev. J. Matheson, as being accurately kept, and showing a balance of \$390.99, and Presbytery passed a hearty vote of thanks to the treasurer, who is rendering such able service.

Rev. Dr. Gracey, of Gananoque, gave an interesting report on the mission and augmented charges, which was adopted. One of the items recommended a grant of \$300 a year to Zion Church, Kingston.

Presbytery decided to hold its next meeting the first Tuesday in March, at 10 a.m., in Convocation Hall.

**WHY HE WORE A BEARD.**  
Incident in Life of Late Sir Mackenzie Bowell.  
The late Sir Mackenzie Bowell has worn a beard for almost sixty years, and due to an incident that occurred in 1859. In writing to J. G. Elliott, the past president of the Canadian Press Association, expressing regret that he could not attend the convention last June in Toronto, and to accept the gavel made from wood of the building in which the organization was formed, he wrote:  
"On my return home after three days' absence in Kingston, attending the provincial fair and organization meeting of the Canadian Press Association, and not having shaved, my good wife expressed the wish that I would go and shave—that I looked rather forlorn. I turned and told her that I never would shave any more, and I have never shaved since."  
The incident was not made public at the time, and is now told in connection with the ex-Premier's death.
