FRENCH AWAIT GERMAN BLOW

Army Chiefs Are Confident And Morale of Soldiers is Excellent.

TWO EFFORTS HAVE FAILED

BRITISH MOVES MADE POSSIBLE BY ADDED STRENGTH.

Tentons Are Now Badly Used Up—Successive Efforts Almost Everywhere Weakened the Enemy.

Paris, Dec. 12.—While they realize the situation is serious owing to the Central Empires' ability to bring over troops from the Russian front, military critics here say there is as yet no immediate danger. That the Germans eventually will launch a big attack against the Allies with a view to breaking the line on this side is a foregone conclusion.

Nevertheless the Germans will have to reckon with an exceedingly strong defensive. British troops is excellent. Meanwhile, the French press calls attention to the fact that a supreme generalissimo is wanted by the Allies, and also refers to the Inter-Allied Conference, which, public opinion thought was going to name the generalissimo who would organize unity of action.

Have Failed Twice—

Lieut.-Col. Rousset, the Petit Parisien's military critic, writing in that paper, is optimistic.

"It is against us that the German effort is being prepared," he says. "Violent counter-attacks near Cambrai have enabled the Germans to retake less than half of the ground captured by the British. The furious drive made against the Italians, while obliging them to retire a little, has not pushed them out on the plain. Both these moves were made mainly through the Central Empires' huge levy of men brought back from the Russian front."

Forget Verdun and Yser.

"The coalition armies are badly used up owing to successive efforts they have had to make almost everywhere. Even if we, too, are tired of this long war, at least we have the satisfaction of seeing behind us, and coming to help us, the new, powerful compact and resolute force brought us from America. I fully realize that our enemies hope to finish the war before America's intervention. They forget Verdun, and the Yser. We shall hold them as long as necessary and prepare with the help of our new Allies, the decisive blow. When the blow comes it will find our enemies considerably weakened by the supreme attempts they will have made."

Demands Supreme Chief.

Gustave Herve, on his side, prints a long article in La Victoire, in which he asks what Allied Government is blind enough not to see that in putting off the nomination of the Inter-Allied generalissimo, the Allies are exposed to a likely catastrophe.

After pointing out the imminent danger which threatens the Allies because of recent events in Russia, Herve says: "Facing us, from Ostend to Venice, we have a single chief, obeyed by all and assisted by one great general headquarters. We have a British commander-in-chief, a French commander-in-chief, an Italian commander-in-chief, and there soon will be an American commander-in-chief, each with his own general headquarters.

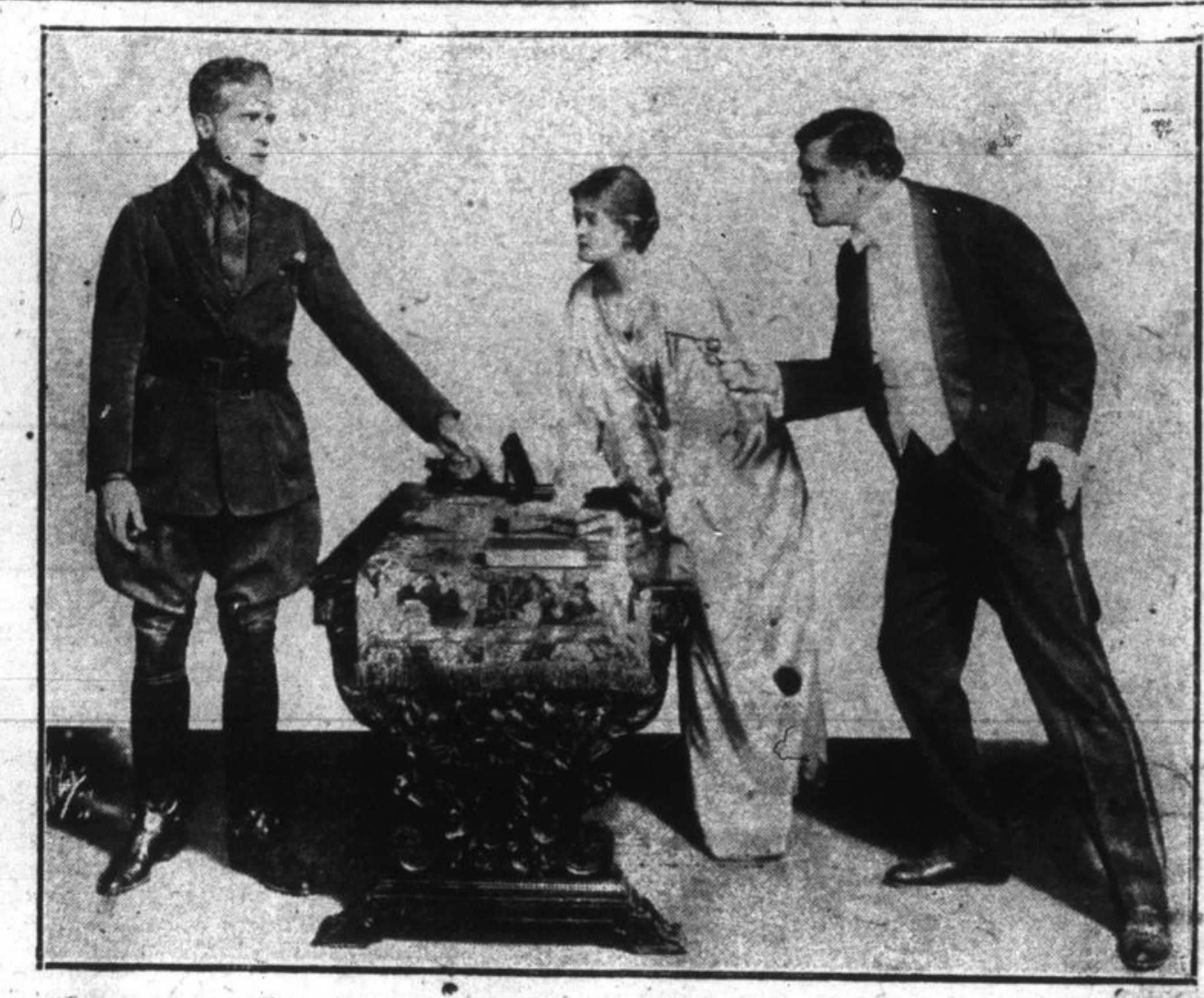

Which part of the line must Hindenburg break, the British, French or Italian, before our good British friends will decide to give us to French public opinion for the creation of a supreme generalissimo?"

WILL GET 100,000 MEN FROM CLASS 1

Head of Military Service Council Refutes Laurier Organization's Propaganda.

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—The Laurier organization has been spreading stories that the required hundred thousand men cannot be secured in class one and that class two, which includes the married men, will have to be called.

An absolute denial to these stories was given to-day by Col. Moss, chairman of the Military Service Council. Class one, he said, would furnish the full quota. "The total number of men who have reported for service or claimed exemption up to December 1st," he declared, "was 403,594; of these only 241,565 had been medically examined. Of those medically examined 117,873 were category 'A' men and 123,692 in lower classes. This leaves 181,023 men at that date still to be examined, and if the same rates of category 'A' men to others is maintained, which might be reasonably expected, it will give an additional 73,532 in category 'A' or 139,455 men in all. The tribunals may exempt nearly fifty per cent, and still have the hundred thousand men. In view of the figures the Military Service Council have not considered the idea of calling out the married

BLIND BRITISH COLONEL WAS LED INTO BATTLE

Historic Episode of King of Bohemia Recalled by Incident on West Front.

British Headquarters in France, Dec. 12.—A staff captain is mentioned in the orders of the day issued by the general commanding a certain British division on the Cambrai front as follows:

"By his heroic conduct he saved the whole brigade, if not the division."

This little note hides the story of the remarkable bravery displayed by this captain under the stimulus of passion aroused by the crippling of his baby girl by a German air raid on England.

During the German attack near Namur on November 30th, single handed and armed only with a heavy stick, he attacked and killed or dispersed a group of Germans who were in possession of an ammunition dump near his headquarters south of Marcoing. He then collected a small and heterogeneous force and pushed on to Les Rue-Vertes, where, in desperate hand-to-hand fighting he effectually cleared the place of Germans. He himself, armed with two revolvers, shot down eight German machine gunners and held the position until relief arrived.

Other thrilling incidents are told of British commanders in desperate situations going personally among the men in the front lines to cheer them. In one case a colonel, already blinded, was led among his men by an orderly.

TRIBUNAL MEMBER IS UNDER ARREST

Held for Perjury in Connection With Burning of Buildings.

Havelock, Dec. 8.—F. J. Squire, a member of the local military exemption tribunal, is in the cells here with two charges entered against him, one of perjury and the other of sending a threatening letter to himself, and with prospects of other more serious charges to follow. Perjury is alleged in connection with the filing of claims for insurance on his buildings, which were burned a couple of weeks ago.

Squire's warehouse and garage were burned about three o'clock in the morning, and the owner immediately directed suspicion to a local young man, Walter Barty, who, Squire affirmed, had sent him a threatening letter because he had refused to grant his (Barty's) claim for exemption.

It was stated that Barty at first received exemption, but the tribunal, after hearing that he had made false statements regarding his grounds for claiming, canceled the exemption. Barty was arrested and has been held in jail ever since, the case having been remanded from time to time. A few days ago Provincial Fire Commissioner Rogers came down and conducted an investigation into the fires. Mr. Squire's evidence was not satisfactory to the commissioner, who ordered his arrest. Mr. Squire has been a merchant in the town for many years, and the turn the case has taken has caused quite a local sensation.

Killed in Portuguese Capital.

Vigo, Spain, Dec. 12.—Seventy persons were killed and 300 or 400 wounded in the uprising in Portugal last week, according to advices reaching here from Lisbon. Most of the houses of that city were damaged by the bombardment.

FACES CHARGE OF MURDER.

George C. Tompkin Stands Trial For Killing Three Persons.

Ebensburg, Pa., Dec. 12.—George C. Tompkins, Philadelphia coal operator, was placed on trial here, charged with murder in connection with the deaths near here on July 15th of Edmund Humphries, and Edmond Humphries, Jr. The Humphries family were members of an automobile party with Tompkins and the three were shot to death on a country road. Tompkins, in summoning assistance after the tragedy, told a story of the party being held up by bandits and shot to death. After his arrest in connection with the crime, it is said that he confessed to the three murders. Later, he is said to have repudiated the confession. It is believed that the defense will be insanity.

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—The lakes in Jasper Park, the fisheries of which became greatly depleted at the time the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway was put through, are being restocked with fish by the Department of the Naval Service. More than 33,000 small fish have been transferred from the Banff hatchery and distributed in the lakes. In splendid condition. The fish distributed consist of 32,000 cut-throat fingerlings, 300 salmon trout fingerlings, and 350 Atlantic salmon fingerlings.

New York, Dec. 12.—The Standard Oil Company, of New York, has announced an advance of one cent a gallon in the price of kerosene for domestic use. The new prices are 14 cents in barrels and 19 cents tank wagon basis.

CAVALRY SUPPORTS COSSACKS.

Leaders of Revolt Rapidly Organize Infantry.

London, Dec. 12.—Novo Tcherkask, capital of the territory of the Don Cossacks, is now the centre of the active movement against the Bolsheviks, a Petrograd despatch to the Star reports. It is said General Alexieff and General Korniloff, former commanders-in-chief, and Michael Rodzianko, president of the Duma, are there. Plenty of cavalry are available, but little infantry, although organization of infantry is being carried on vigorously.

"Something may happen in a day or two," the despatch adds.
