FOUND NO COMPLAINT ABOUT SERVICE ACT Major Porter Reports It is Dealing Fairly and Squarely With Everyone.

Major R. E. Porter, representing Lieut.-Col. Street, district representative of the Militia Department, has returned from a visit of the third military district from Kingston to Cornwall. He made the trip for the purpose of visiting the various tribunals and especially to interview the military representatives, in order to clear up reported misunderstandings in regard to the taking of men off the farm for military service. As a result of his visit Major Porter found that there were practically no complaints whatever about the working of the Military Service Act. Major Porter explained how that men who were needed on the farm were left to continue their work, but those who could be spared were to be taken just the same as young men in the city. He also went into the workings of the tribunals and by his missionary work succeeded in clearing up many points for parties interested, and the general opinion was that the Military Service Act was dealing fairly and squarely with everyone.

125 FARMERS FOR EXEMPTION

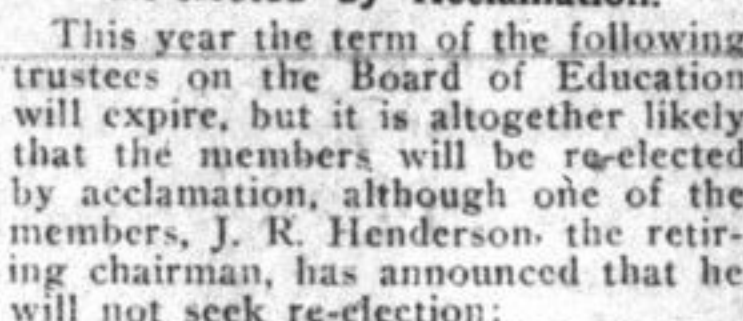
Appeals From the Decisions of the Tribunals Are Pouring In.

The Union Government's last minute efforts to save the farmers from the Military Service Act has been taken advantage of by some 125 farmers of this county. A. W. Sireth, District Agricultural Representative is looking after this work and is certainly busy, being in conference with J. T. Richardson, the appointee of the Minister of Militia. The appeals for exemption from military service came from practically every farmer of the county. These have been heard and a great many disallowed. Now there is the gravest anxiety on the part of the farmers and their representative to have these disallowance decisions cancelled so that all of the farmers engaged in production will be allowed to continue in that vocation until after the war. According to the present indications all of the appeals now being entered will be granted.

BOUGHT VICTORY BOND. Collegiate Pupils Will Erect a Memorial For Fallen Comrades.

At the meeting of the Board of Education, held on Thursday night, W. J. Saunders, who is acting principal of the Collegiate Institute during the illness of E. O.
