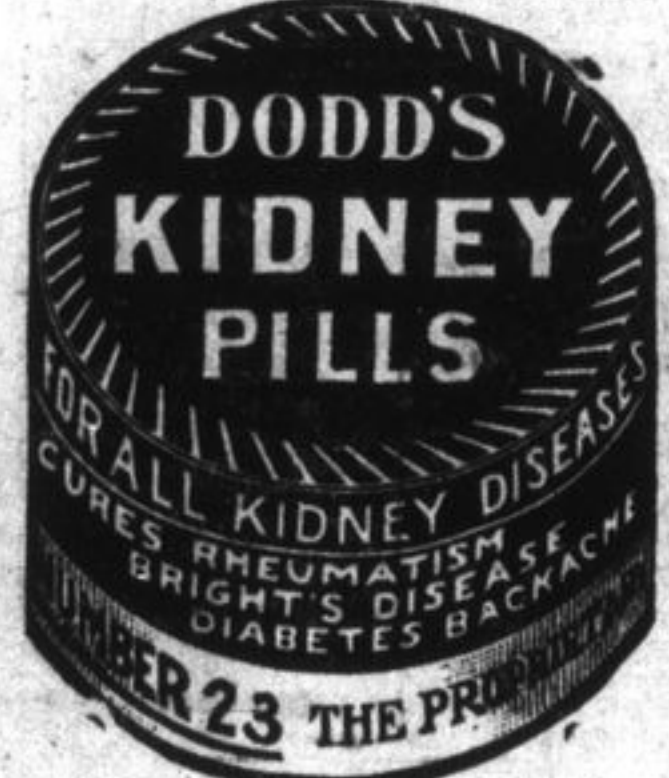
The Theatres

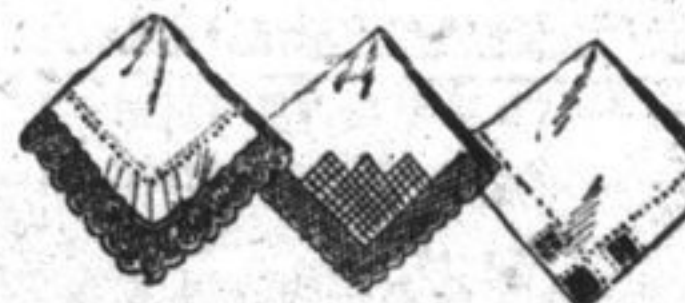
