BUDGET FROM BATTERSEA
HOLDER BROS. HORSE BARN DESTROYED BY FIRE.
Regret Expressed Over Death of John Hughes of Kingston—New Organ Installed in Methodist Church.
Battersea, Dec. 18.—The union school concert conducted by Miss Mabel Anglin of Battersea School and Miss Sadie Anglin of Cedar Lake school in the Orange hall on the 12th inst. was a splendid success. The large crowd present enjoyed the very creditable entertainment put on by the children and the play entitled "The Wooling of Miss Canada," by the Battersea Dramatic Club. Mrs. Coding ably acted the part of "Miss Canada."
The children of the Methodist Sunday school are being prepared now for the annual entertainment to be held on Christmas Eve.
The new Thomas organ lately installed in the Methodist church is giving good satisfaction. The old one was transferred to the school house for the use of the pupils and teacher.
Voting in connection with the great war election was conducted very quietly but earnestly here on Monday. Very little electioneering was necessary, because, thanks to the loyal and unselfish example set by the Whig politicians were pretty well kept in the background and a Win-the-war spirit was manifested by the electors.
Last Wednesday afternoon the rural phone fire alarm warned the countryside for miles around that Holder Bros' horse barn was on fire. POULTRY SHOW IS CLOSED
VERY SUCCESSFUL IN SPITE OF WAR CONDITIONS.

On Thursday evening the show came to a close after a most successful exhibition, considering the conditions under which it was held. The arrangements proved a most suitable place, and the collection of an exhibition declared by experts to be of a very high class.
A feature was the addresses on matters of vital interest to the poultry raiser and breeder given by Miss Yates, of the Dominion Agricultural Branch instructional staff. She is intensely practical and interesting, and showed to large crowds every afternoon and evening the advantages of certain methods of handling poultry and preparing it for the market and the consumer.
Another feature was a demonstration of the marketing systems in Egypt, Denmark and Prince Edward Island. These methods can be used in Canada, and the Agricultural Department showed how by means of a huge chart, lighted by electric lights. It proved very attractive, and was studied by many.
At the evening show Thursday Mayor J. M. Hughes came in at nine o'clock and made the draw for the prizes of the poultry show. They resulted as follows:

Following the drawing the mayor made a short comment on the value of having a poultry show in the city and the fact that it did much in this crisis of the nation's history to help in Greater Production.
