Raymond Walker Victim of Unfortunate Accident Early Wednesday Morning—Kitchen of Home Damaged to Extent of \$200.

Raymond Walker, an insurance agent, living at 379 Marie street, was terribly burned shortly after midnight Tuesday night when endeavoring to hurry up his fire with coal oil.

An explosion followed, and Mr. Walker was enwrapped in flames, and a portion of his clothing was totally destroyed. He very pluckily succeeded in beating out the flames, and then sent an alarm to the firemen.

Mr. Walker suffered much from severe burns about the face and body, and was removed to the Hotel Dieu. He was attended by Dr. Stanley Keyes, and the latter stated Wednesday forenoon that he was doing as well as could be expected.

Capt. Cockay, and the firemen from Brock street station responded to the call, and succeeded in confining the blaze to the kitchen. The damage will amount to about \$200.
