### The Theatres

The boys of the Signal Training Depot, Ottawa, who were sent to Kingston last September to train as N.C.O.'s, have completed their courses. They will return to Ottawa shortly after the New Year for instructional work in the Second Eastern Ontario Depot Battalion, which will be formed at the Exhibition Grounds.

The great majority of the officers and soldiers in the garrison spent Christmas at their homes. Those who were here had a royal time at dinner and spent the afternoon with their friends.

The Military Hospitals Commission had over 500 pounds of turkey on Christmas Day.
