## MAJOR SEARS' WIFE KILLED

Met Accidental Death in London, England, a Cable Says.

## WEDDED TWO YEARS AGO AND WENT OVERSEAS WITH HER HUSBAND.

Deceased Was Formerly Miss Irene Jackson, of Brockville, and Was Twenty-two Years of Age.

Mrs. Brenda Sears, the twenty-two year old wife of Major Winthrop Sears, who raised the 33rd Battery in Kingston, was accidentally killed on Wednesday in London, England; according to a cable received by her grandfather, Judge McDonald, of Brockville.

The tragic message will bring sincere regret to many Kingstonsians. Deceased's husband is one of the best known of Kingstonsians overseas, having for many years resided at "Heathfield" on the York Road. On December, 29th, 1915, he was married to Miss Brenda Jackson, of Brockville. She was a daughter of Lieut.-Col. (Dr.) and Mrs. Jackson, of that town.

Major and Mrs. Sears resided on Earl street while the 33rd Battery was being trained for overseas service. The deceased accompanied him when he went to England, and remained there with her father and two sisters, Doris and Athol, at Folkestone, when the major went to France with the Imperial artillery. On Christmas Day a cable was received by her grandfather that all was well, but on Thursday the tragic message was received.

No particulars except the statement that she had been accidentally killed were received. It is pathetic to learn that the Judge on Thursday morning's mail received a letter from her dated December 10th.

The survivors beside her husband are her parents, her father, who is in Westcliffe Hospital, Folkestone, two sisters, Doris and Athol, two half-brothers, Dr. Gordon F. Jackson, Haileybury, and A. Bartlett Jackson, Moison's Bank, Hamilton, and one half-sister, Mrs. Russell H. Britton, Haileybury.
