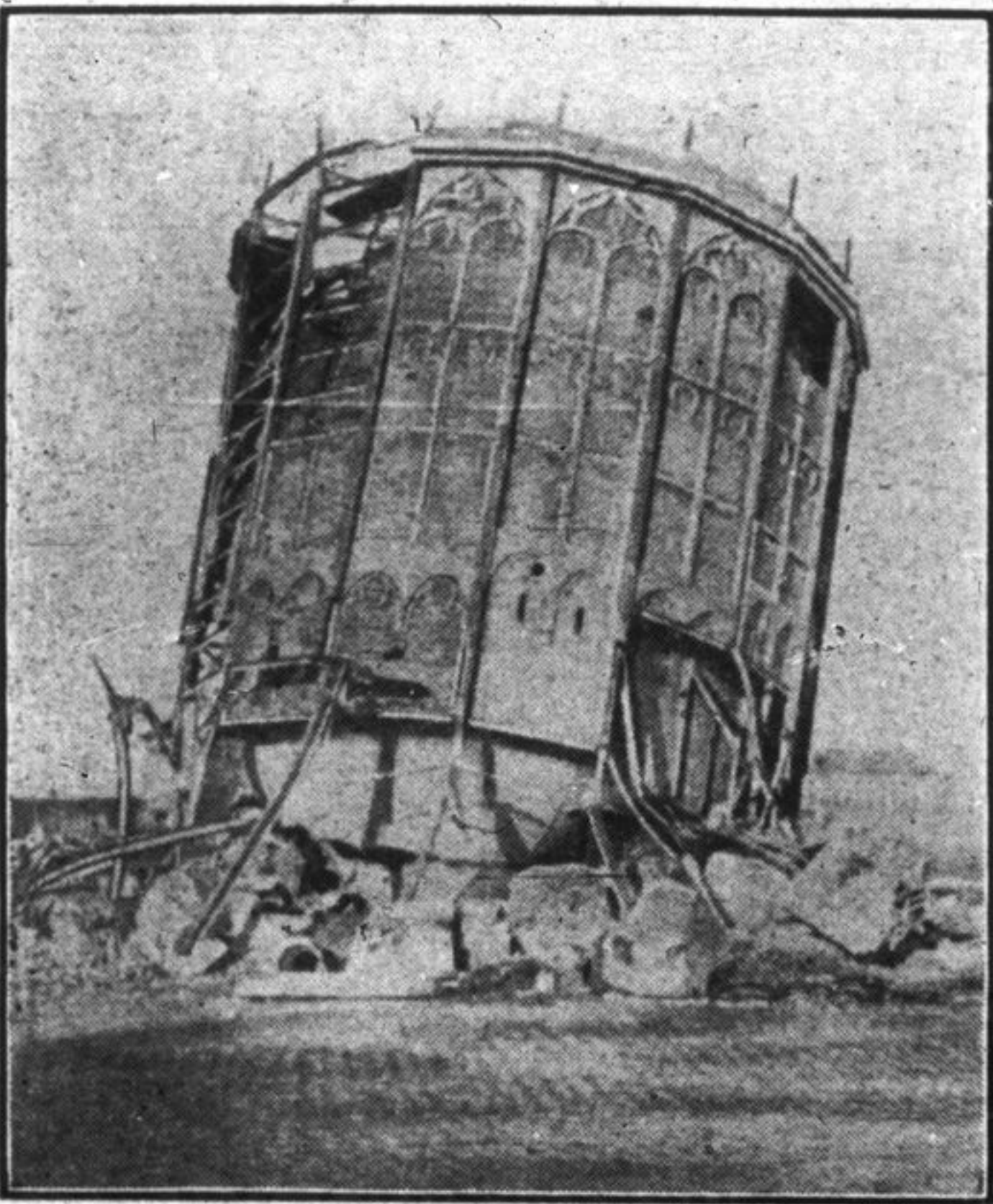
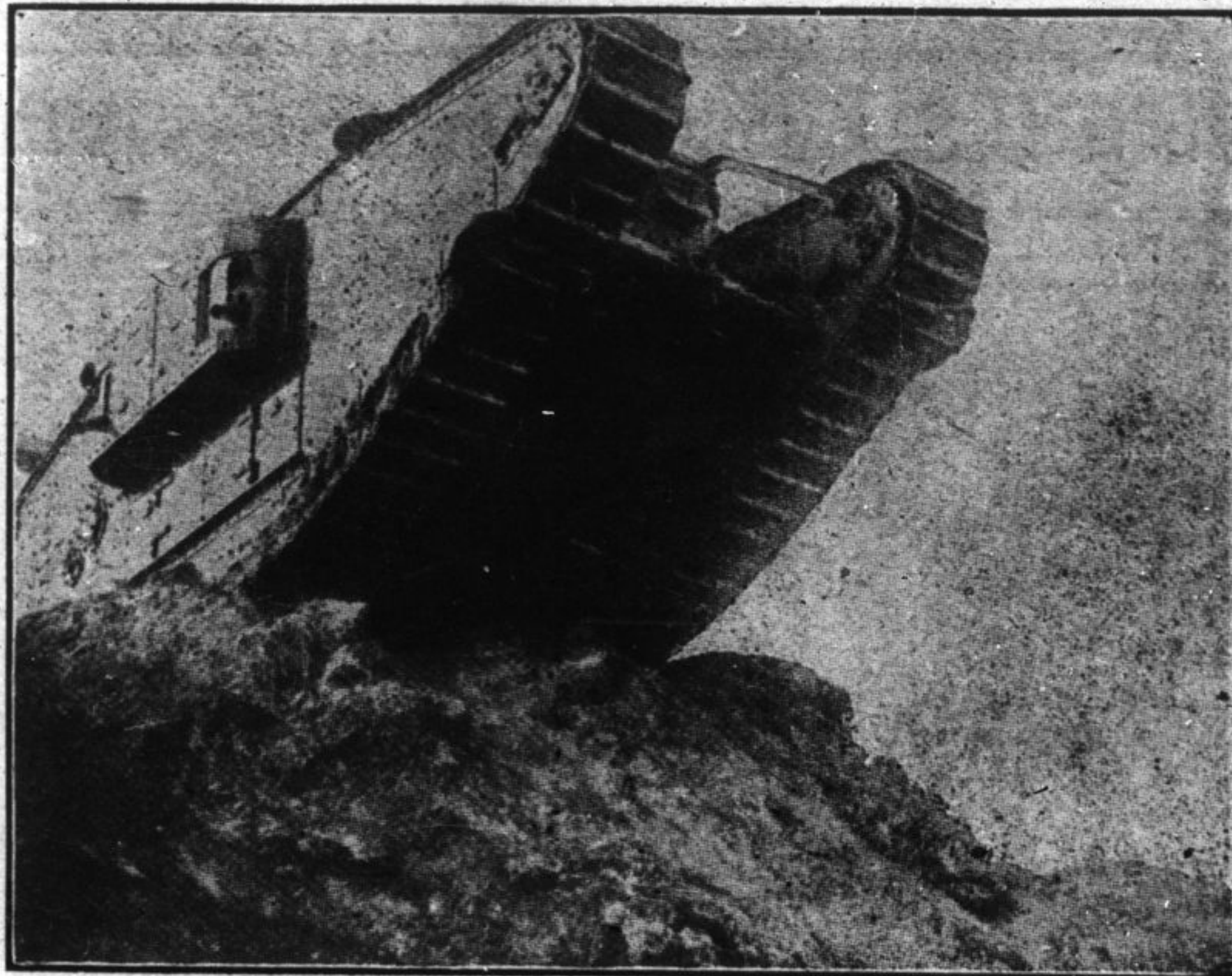


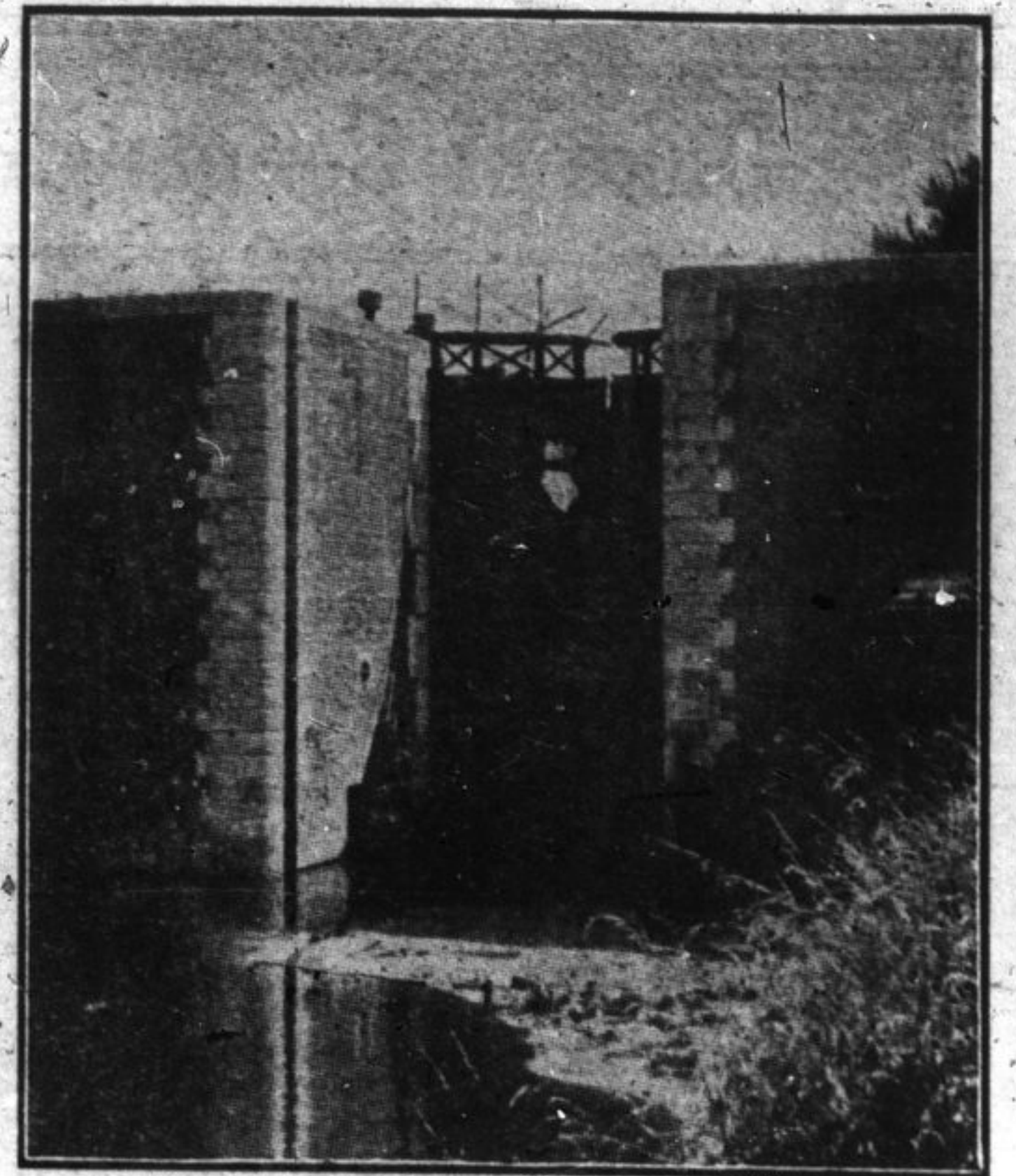
# Land Cruisers on The Field - Scenes on Italian and West Fronts



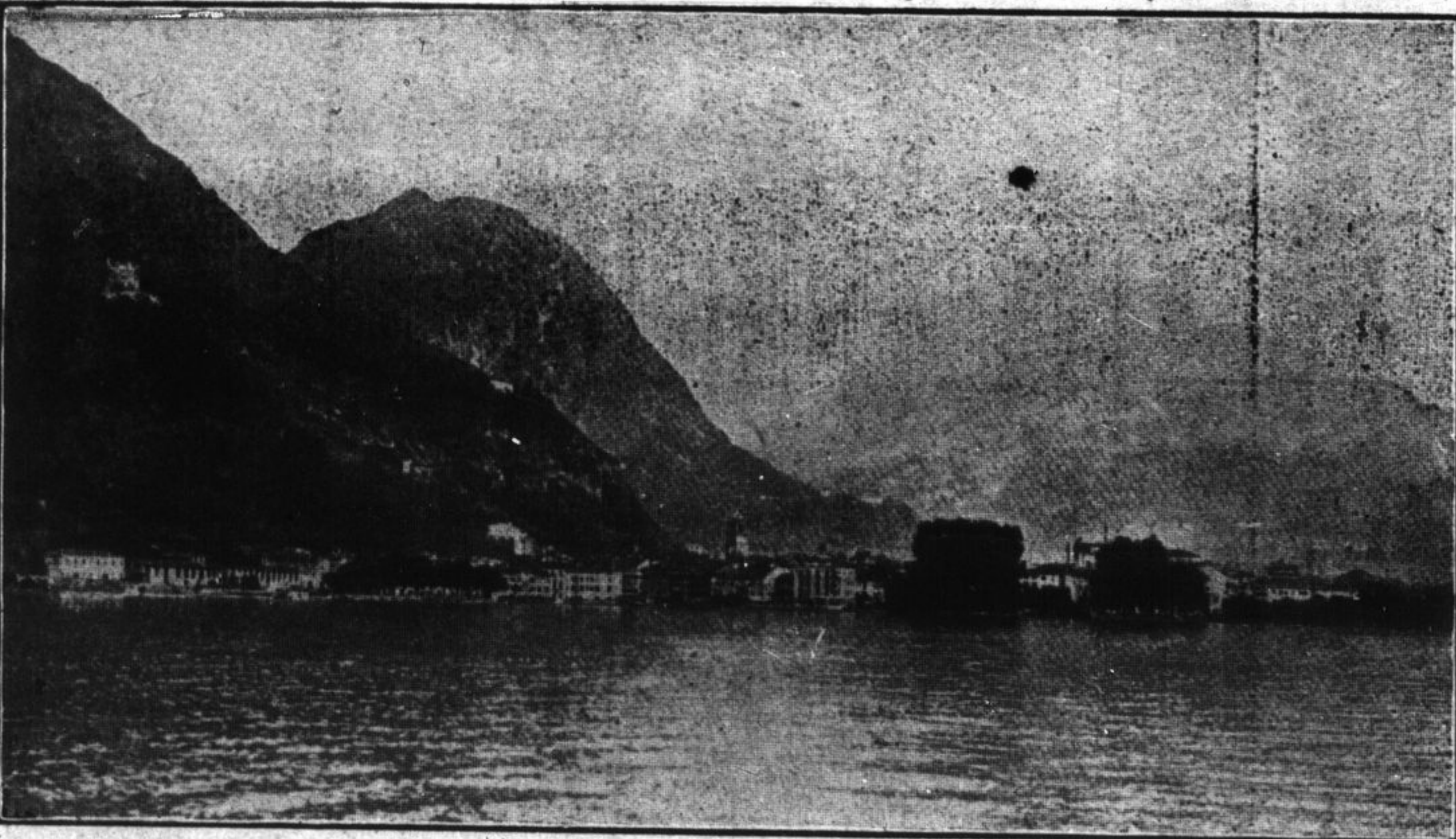
A memento of the German bombardments of Ypres. Suggesting the "Leaning Tower" of Pisa after bombardment: Ypres reservoir tower.



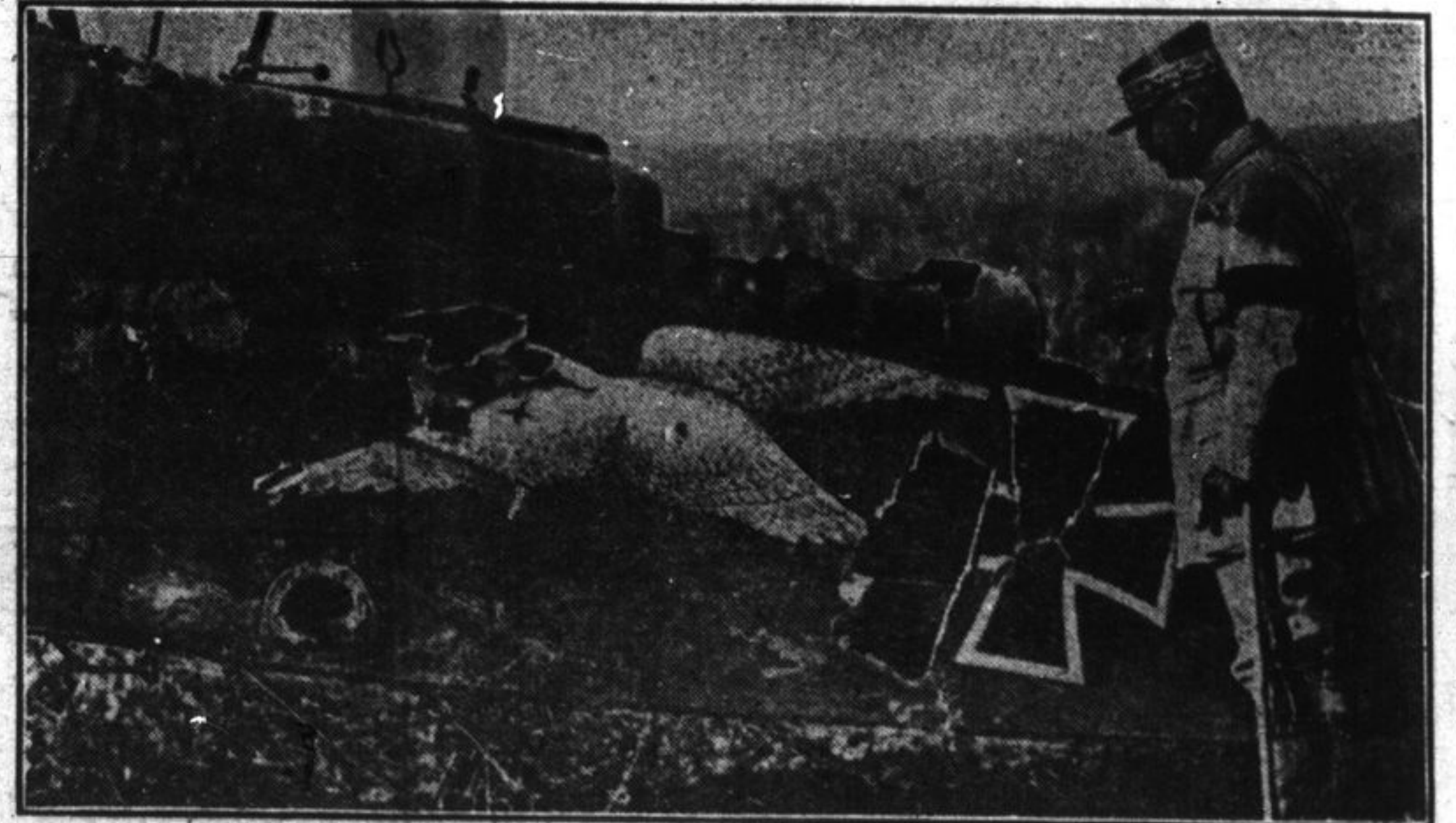
Just before the regulated "Topple": A tank of the type used at Cambrai, in action.



With the water nearly drained off: A lock on the Ypres Canal.



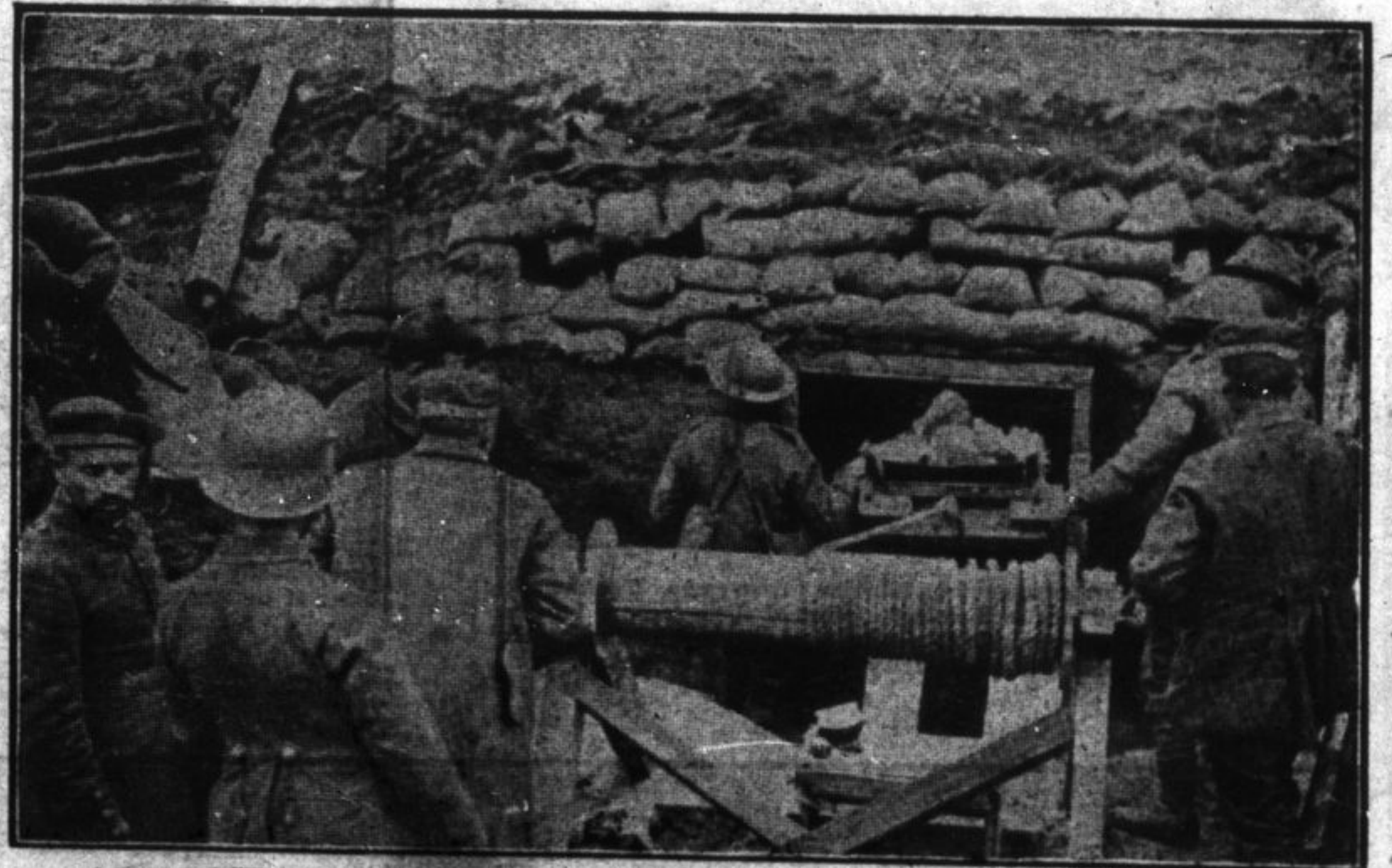
An Italian scene. The head of the valleys leading to the northern end of Lake Garda. The town of Riva stands at the northern end of Lake Garda, which is long and narrow, and in fact occupies a valley between two almost parallel ranges of hills. Two streams flow into this northern end of the lake. One of them, the Sarca, flows past the picturesque little town of Arco. The hills pitch up steeply from the lake in sugar-loaf form. Away to the right beyond them lie Rovereto and the upper waters of the Adige.



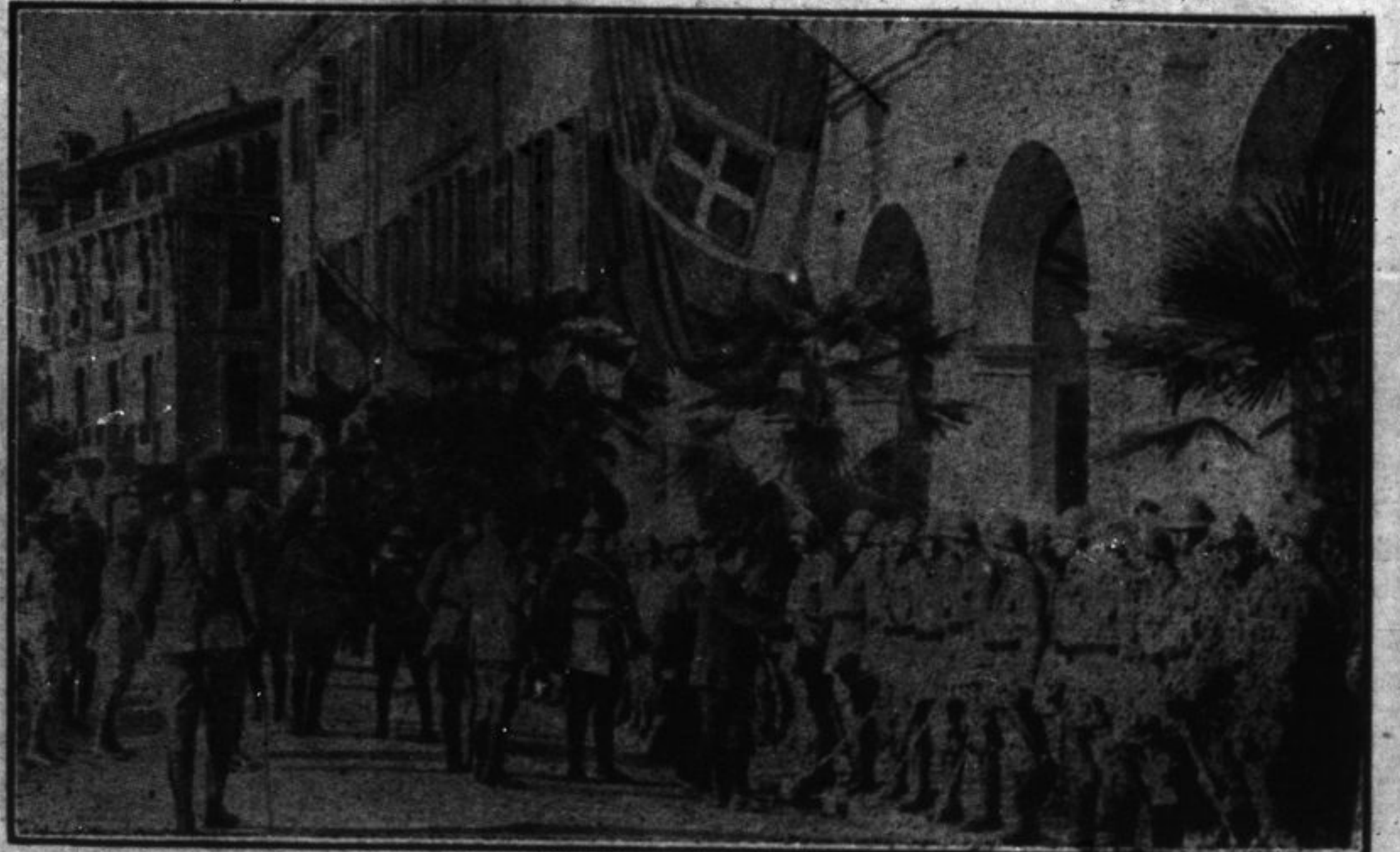
