

Rev. Douglas Laing Preached-The Bishop of Ontario in St. George's on Sunday Evening.

The new organ recently installed at the First Baptist Church was used for the first time on Sunday, and gave entire satisfaction.

Sydney A. Salisbury presided at the organ, and handled it well. The choir rendered a fine musical programme, the anthems being especi-ally good. The organ cost in the neighborhood of \$2,200 and the congregation was much impressed with

its work. Rev. D. Laing, the former pastor, preached at both the Sunday services and delivered forceful sermons.

In St. George's Cathedral. Bishop Bidwell officiated at service in St. George's cathedral on Sunday evening, preaching from the text, "He that wait upon the Lord will renew their strength." The bishop referred to this war as being not only material but spiritual and to those on our side it would be necessary to renew their spiritual strength to carry on successfullly.
