The Italian army was under the supreme command of Gen. Cadorna from the beginning of the war until a few days ago, when Cadorna was put in a relatively inferior position and a new general appointed, assisted by a British and French officer.

There have been many shifts in leadership since the war began, and some of them surprisingly sudden. It seems a long time ago since Sir Edward Grey (now Lord Grey of Faldoen) was Foreign Secretary.

There has been a general idea that the present incumbent will not remain long in office. Even the German war machine, which was supposed to be the last word in efficiency in August, 1914, had new chiefs for its army and for its navy.

The British army has had two Sea Lords. A former admiral has risen to be chief of the British staff; a former engineer presided over the Admiralty as First Lord.

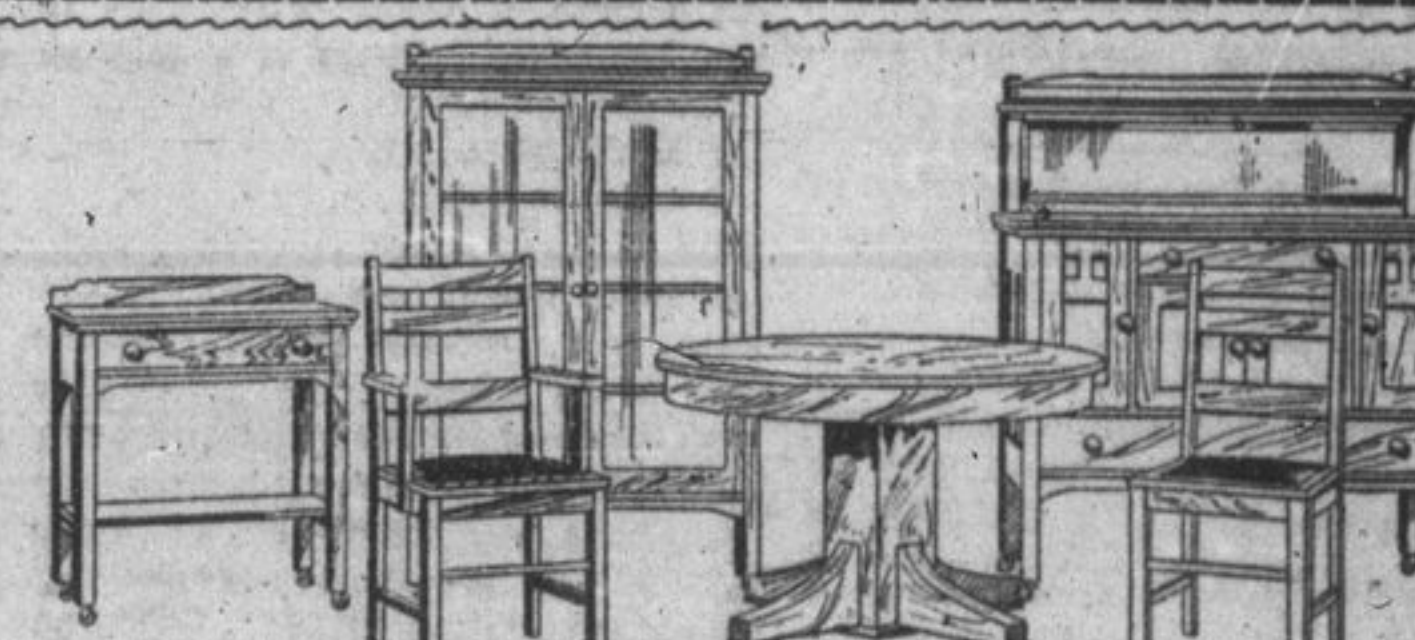
