## MUST NOT "HOG" COAL

DEALERS GIVING ONLY TO THOSE WHO ARE IN NEED.

Some Citizens Who Ordered Coal Had a Fair Supply, and Coal Was Carted to People Who Were in Want.

If you have a good supply of coal in your cellar do not ask for more, for you will not get it. The local coal dealers are adhering strictly to the regulations agreed upon a few days ago at the conference held with Mayor Hughes. So people who try to "hog" the coal will run up against a snag. Coal is now selling at \$10.50 to \$11.50 a ton. Dealers have instructed their carters to see what supply the citizen has on hand before they dump more coal into his cellar, and in case they find a fair supply the coal will be taken to some person who is in need of it. A number of citizens have been deprived of a further supply because of the fact that they already had a good supply of coal. It is stated that a carter who went to deliver coal at one house found that there was such a large supply on hand that he would have to get busy and trim the coal already on hand, if he wanted to put more in the cellar. It is needless to say that this citizen did not get the coal.

"We are trying our best to keep our customers supplied," said one dealer to the Whig on Tuesday morning, "and it is not fair that some citizens should be getting more coal all the time while others are running short. If we find that a citizen has a good supply we will certainly not let him have any more."
