### MEN ARE SAVED TO SERVE

CANON FITZGERALD GIVES AN ADDRESS ON "MISSIONS."

At the Week of Prayer Meeting held in Bethel Congregational Church on Thursday Evening.

There was a large attendance at the week of prayer meeting held in Bethel Congregational Church on Thursday evening and at which Rev. T. DeCourcy Rayner presided. The address was given by Canon W. F. Fitzgerald of St. Paul's church, whose subject was "Missions."

Canon Fitzgerald said that there are four areas in the history of missions — or rather the history of "The Mission" — in the apostolic time we never doubt that the church itself was the great mission power; as every individual realized that the first business of a Christian was to make other people Christians, so the church seemed to be doing nothing by limited instruments while it was all working with power in the Holy Spirit. It was in one sense doing nothing but spreading from the Apostolic time when the whole church was launched upon the world to be itself the Christianizing power. This was the first era of missions; and on ideal era it was.

Pass on a century or two, said Canon Fitzgerald, and you are struck with the fact that the work of great missionaries is no longer the work of the whole church, but of amazing men, of great saints filled with the spirit of God, going forth without scruple, conscious of God's power. You see such men as Patrick, Alpharad, Columba or St. Martin. — You see the great "Personal Era" of missions. Men triumphed through the cross.

This era was followed by what I shall call the governmental era of missions. The time when kings and conquerors gave to tribes the choice between Holy Baptism and the sword. Then came such strange events as the successful propagation of Christianity in Russia by such a body as the Teutonic knights. We ought to realize that the crusades and the Inquisition were the natural sequence and consequence and climax of Governments taking it in hand for their special imperial business to convert the heathen world. The history of this era is sad reading.

The next era in the history of missions is that which is known to us now. The era of societies. These societies are based upon certain principles. They engage enthusiasm, they enlist fanaticism, they have a considerable power in bringing to bear the riches of rich men. But they are after all, societies within a society, whose special business it is to do this work.

In conclusion Canon Fitzgerald said: "God help and lead us towards a unity of heart and purpose in co-operating with Him, conscious that mission work should be that of His church and that each member may realize 'he has been saved to serve.'"
