About seventy friends and former neighbors of Corporal Lennius Bates attended a party, given in his honor at the home of Gordon Bhusnell, Whitesown, Friday last. A valuable gold watch was presented to him with an address.

Mrs. Amos Marvin, wife of A. Marvin, passed away Sunday at the family residence, Sidney. Deceased, whose maiden name was Miss Agnes Boster, was born at the Carrying Place, Oct. 18th, 1856, and resided at Sidney for about ten years.

Stephen Tufts, died at Tuftsville on Thursday last from senile decay. He was eighty years of age. He was a successful farmer and merchant, a good speaker, a man of high character. He was an ardent Conservative and Methodist. Two sons and two daughters survive.

TRAGIC END OF HAVELOCK MAN

His Life Crushed Out When Logs Rolled on Him.

Havelock, Jan. 14.—Clarence S. Hubble, Havelock, met a tragic death when he was crushed beneath a load of logs he was bringing to Havelock from the country.

The accident happened just north of Alex. McArthur's residence, four miles north. The deceased was ring-barked maple logs and drove in the ditch in turning on the road again the load threatened to slide and he attempted to hold the logs with a cant hook from the low side of the load.

As the team started the load the king bolt on the front bob pulled out, throwing the logs to one side and upon the unfortunate fellow. Death resulted almost instantly, his body being crushed beneath the logs. His son, Master Eddie and Howard Dufos were witnesses of the awful fatality, and they succeeded in extracting the body from beneath the timber.

Awarded the D. S. O. Cornwall, Jan. 10.—Two more soldiers from this section have received the D. S. O., Lieut. Col. Chilton Harvey, C.E., of Lanfester, who went overseas with the Railway Construction Corps, and did splendid construction work and Major Donald J. McDonald, son of Dr. McDonald, ex-M. P. for Glengarry. Major McDonald enlisted in the west with the Strathcona Horse in the fall of 1914, with the rank of lieutenant. He was found in the spring of 1915, and came home for two months while convalescent. On returning to England he received the Military Cross for gallantry leading his men after having been wounded. In the re-entire of the battle of Cambrai the Colonel of McDonald's battalion was killed in action early in the battle, and the young Glengarry, who had been promoted to the rank of major in the meantime, was left in command of the regiment.

His shop on Yonge street was the place of call for many members of former Ontario cabinets. Deceased, who was fifty-three years of age, was a native of Kingston. The remains arrived in Kingston Tuesday morning, and the funeral is to take place Thursday morning to St. Mary's Cathedral. Deceased is survived by his wife, mother, and one sister, all of Toronto.
