**PRESENTED WITH PURSE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY**

**REV. DOUGLAS LAING REMEMBERED BY FIRST BAPTISTS**

Following the presentation, the congregation arose and sang "Auld Lang Syne." Following this, the members spent a social time together. A fine musical programme was rendered, and refreshments were served. The programme consisted of a solo, Miss Emma Singleton; solo, Mrs. Turner; piano solo, Mrs. Prof. Mather.

**NABBED BY THE POLICE**

**A LADY BOARDER MADE OFF WITH SOME STOLEN GOODS.**

Pleading Guilty When Arraigned Before Magistrate, and Was Remanded for a Week—Young Man Handled Over to the Military Authorities.

Lillian Kish, a young woman who came to Kingston from Montreal last September, while boarding at a house on Brock street skipped out Wednesday with some articles belonging to the mistress of the house. She made off with a purse containing \$1.50, waists, skirts, hosiery and other things. The matter was reported to the police, and Constable Ernest Clark, who had been given a description of the accused, spotted her on Princess street and placed her under arrest. Arraigned before Magistrate Farrell on Thursday morning, the young woman pleaded guilty, and was remanded for a week. She says she does not know why she stole the goods.

Questioned by the magistrate, the young woman unfolded a sad story. She said her home was in Harrow, but that she had been working in a cigar factory in Montreal. She came to Kingston in September last. Her father is dead. She did not live with her mother, as she could not get along at home.

"Who is to blame for that?" asked the magistrate.

"Mother is just as much to blame as I am," was the reply.

Constable Clark stopped the young woman on Princess street three times before he placed her under arrest. She answered to the description of the woman wanted, but denied that she had been boarding on Brock street. Finally she decided to go to the boarding house, to the constable, and on their arrival there the mistress of the house identified her as the former boarder.

The young woman left the house on Wednesday morning and stated that she was going to Nanawan.

Thomas Sinnott, remanded on Wednesday on a charge of failing to report under the Military Service Act, was handed over to the military authorities.

Questioned by the magistrate, Sinnott said that he had not asked for exemption. He signed papers for service overseas, and he was under the impression that a sergeant would come to his house after him.

**Recovered Stolen Ring.**

Lillian Kish, the young woman who was arrested for theft from her boarding house, stole a ring. Thursday afternoon Constable Arnie located the missing ring in a pawn shop, where the young woman had disposed of it for \$1.

**SOLDIER FROM KINGSTON.**

Was Found Dead in a Lane Off a Montreal Street.

A Canadian Press despatch from Montreal says: Four bodies were taken to the morgue here, yesterday. Among them was Harry Bowman, a soldier of Kingston, Ont., who was found dead in a lane off Visitation street, near Sherbrooke street, and is thought to have died of hemorrhage.

Harry Bowman was a well-known Kingstonian. He was born in the city some twenty-five years ago. His mother residing on King street west. He was married and lived on St. Catherine street. On December 8th last he gave up his taxi work and enlisted, going to the front with the relief party which was sent to Halifax. In this party was also Alexander Dunne. The details of the tragedy have not yet been received.
