NOT PROPER WHARF SITE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

A DEEPER LOCATION IS NECESSARY, MARINE MEN SAY.

Board of Trade Discusses Public Wharf Question—To Ask the Government, for the Old Bridge Timber.

That the plan for locating a public wharf at the foot of Clarence street is wrong, was stated at the meeting of the board of trade held on Thursday night, and from the evidence presented to the board by Capt. John Donnelly and J. M. Campbell, the present plans will undoubtedly be completely changed and a new location selected.

Mayor Hughes first presented the story of the proposal. He outlined the need of a public wharf. The government was calling for tenders for the removal of the temporary crossing over the Cataract river, and the city proposed to go to the Department of Public Works and with it erect a public wharf at the foot of Clarence street, the cost not to exceed \$30,000. The Kingston Construction company, through Allen George G. Wright, offered the stone to fill the cribwork. The mayor said that he wanted members of the Board of Trade to accompany the civic delegation to Ottawa to find out if the material in the bridge could be purchased at a reasonable price. The conference with the Minister of Public Works was planned for next Wednesday.

J. M. Campbell asked: "What revenue would come back from the sinking of \$30,000 in a proposition of this kind?"

Capt. John Donnelly followed by saying that the proposed location was not the place for a wharf. All the water inside of martello tower is too shallow and would have to go out 150 yards further to get into the eighteen-foot channel which would be worth considering. The Welland canal had a twenty-five-foot draft. The coal vessels, etc., would be unable to use such wharf and therefore it would be useless except for the smaller craft. The ten and twelve-foot draft vessels which have been in use in these waters have since the war been sent to the seaboard, and marine men now know that they will be replaced by the deeper-draft boats.

Mayor Hughes, in answering the questions raised, stated that the citizens wanted a public wharf. The motor boats from the islands was one consideration. The wharf is land people want it for their ferry steamer. This city would need it for itself at times, to prove which he cited the case of the schooner which, two years ago, brought municipal coal here and, owing to lack of wharf facilities, had a heavy charge of demurrage against the city.

Charles Livingston spoke as a merchant who was affected by the island trade. He said that the mayor should be congratulated on his stand.

Elmer Davis said that Kingston's position had been a matter of adverse comment. A public wharf, Mr. Davis contended, would be available for the landing of a barge by a citizen, and would take away the chance of that citizen being "held up" by the present owners of the wharves.

Capt. Donnelly replied that he was not against the idea of a public wharf. He was against the plan to build one which would give accommodation only to boats which drew less than nine feet of water, particularly when the city could get revenue from a proper structure.

Ald. Wright said that the plan was being launched solely for the benefit of the city. If the water at the wharf did not prove deep enough the place could be dredged.

Capt. Donnelly remarked that the package freighters were the revenue producers, and they drew thirteen to fourteen feet of water. At times they can barely get into Swift's wharf without grounding.

R. J. Carson moved, seconded by F. J. Lockett, "that the president and Oliver Chown and C. Livingston be delegates from the Board of Trade to join the civic delegation at Ottawa in regard to the purchase of material for the public wharf."

J. M. Campbell closed the discussion by saying: "You are absolutely flinging your money away by building such a wharf."

W. F. Nickle said that the location of the wharf would be determined later. In the meantime the timber could be secured. With this the discussion closed to the satisfaction of everyone.
