Military News

The military authorities are again making an effort to help in the production of the problems of the country. While farmers are being drafted it is their intention to try and release all available medically unfit men for their work on the farms. An order issued on Saturday reads: "Men in the Special Service Company in category 'C,' whether married or single, who are bona fide farmers and desire to be released in order to return to their work on their farms, shall be released as their services can be dispensed with."

There will be no more warrant of officers in the C.E.F. in Canada. In orders appears a notice that there are no class I.W.O's. in the C.E.F. in Canada, and therefore all warrant officers returning from overseas must report.

Soldiers who are enlisted under the Military Service Act, and who are subsequently categorized by medical boards as being in category "B," will be transferred to the Special Service Company.

Lieut. M. I. McGlade, attached to the C.F.T., and Capt. A. D. Harper have been taken on the strength of the C.E.F. in Canada.

Frontenac Chapter, I.O.D.E., arranged a programme and treat for the patients in Ougwanada Hospital, Friday evening. Sergt. J. A. Mason, Lanark, who has been at Kingston, taking a course in Physical Training and Bayonet Fighting, passed his examination and received a certificate as instructor. He is now instructing at the Forestry Depot, Brockville.

Lieut. S. E. Young, Canadians, and A. M. Mitchell, who left the Royal Military College to take commissions in the Army Service Corps, have been gazetted as flying officers.

Mrs. W. Barland, 327 Barrie street, has been advised that her husband, Sergt.-Major William Barland, W.O. "B" Battery, R.C.H.A., has been awarded the Military Medal for bravery on the battlefield. He has been in active service since the war began and has escaped all harm. He hopes to be granted leave at an early date,

and visit his home here.

The latest figures of the Military Hospital Commission show that the population of the military convalescent hospitals and sanatoria has decreased 631 since the previous census. The population on January 8th totalled 11,135, with 9,257 patients in the convalescent hospitals, 1,350 in the sanatoria, and 528 in other hospitals.

In connection with the vocational training of returned soldiers, the Ontario Department of Agriculture has announced that sixty farm tractors have been sent to Guelph, London, Whitby and Kingston for the purpose of instructing returned men in their care and operation. Machine shops have been established at these places. The Government will have 130 farm tractors in operation next spring, and men who have done their bit overseas will have first call when the time comes for selecting the crews, provided they have the necessary qualifications, because trained men are necessary in the operation of these machines.

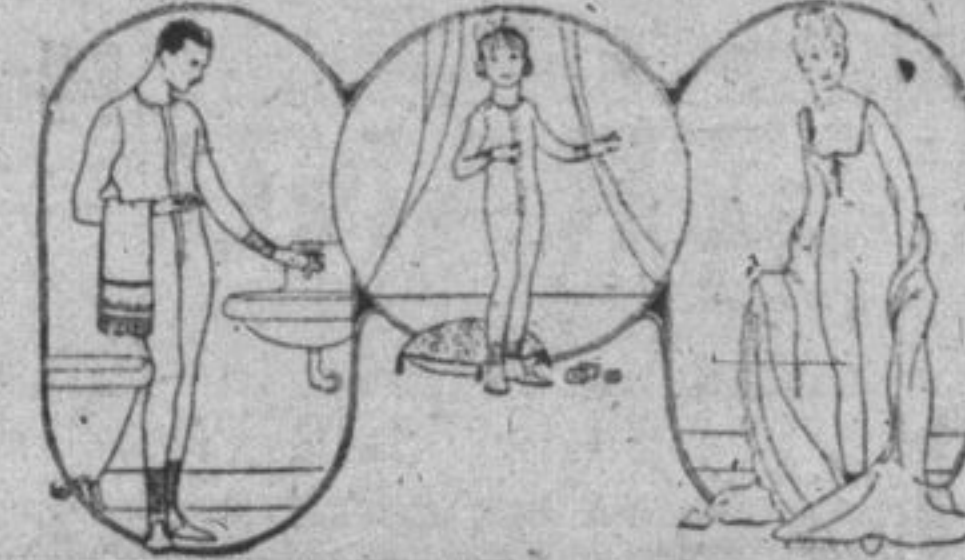
